Longland Meadow Maintenance Plan

Aim

To sustain and enhance Longland Meadow. To provide a natural, peaceful area for recreation. To support wildlife, biodiversity and natural habitat.

Objectives

Piddington Lane Entrance

- Apply wood chip as required to protect access when wet
- Remove low hedging adjacent to 2 Little End
- Remove tree stumps at entrance and reprofile to improve access
- Reduce hedge on Church Spinney boundary to 8ft and remove diseased elm within it
- · Replace vehicular access gate with 15ft gate and reposition

Central area

Appropriate mowing regime (fortnightly during main season) to keep grass area short and tidy

Hedges

 Annual flailing and topping off of all hedges to promotes the thick, dense cover necessary for many of our smaller breeding bird and dormice

Orchard

Spray around trees to create 1m circles to be woodchipped to protect trees from mower

Carey Copse/Church Spinney

- Twice yearly flailing to fix a tidy edge and prevent encroachment
- Prune and thin trees as required to maintain healthy growth

Summer Meadow

• First cut late August, minimum of 4 cuts per season

Memorial Strip

First cut early June then fortnightly to end of season

Butterfly Patch

To be sprayed off and re-established

Bulb Strip

Additional planting as required

Pond

- Remove excess vegetation and "thug" plants, plant native marginal plants on new terraces to be constructed on the western edge of the pond
- Remove silt and stones

Boundaries

Crown raise trees between Carey Copse and 2 Little End

 Mow in line with central area all boundaries with the exception of the Memorial Strip and Butterfly Patch

General

- Define pathways through the whole site by close regular mowing throughout the growing season
- Clean/repair/replace bird boxes as appropriate
- Use small piles of chippings to provide habitats for frogs and toads
- Create a secured log pile
- Continue to encourage users to pick up after their dogs and take all litter home for disposal
- Replace/update signage
