## **Hackleton Parish Council cares**

Response to Wootton Resident: Who cares about us??

Hackleton Parish Council cares deeply about all residents and areas of our parish. You will be aware of our Neighbourhood Plan which champions the creation of an off-road cycle and footway through the neighbourhood area to link the villages to the Wootton area of the Parish. Funding and development opportunities for this are constantly under review.

We have regularly advertised prior to elections and when vacancies arise for councillors to come forward to represent Wootton and St George's Fields and have tried to engage wherever possible. Unfortunately without a councillor representing this particular area it is difficult to understand issues or try to resolve them. All of our meetings are open to the public and the agendas published on our website and advertised on our noticeboards (of which two are located in Wootton).

The open grass areas to which you refer are not the responsibility of the Parish Council and residents pay additional charges to the maintenance companies to have these areas looked after. If the Parish Council was to do additional works to these areas then our precept which is funded through your council tax would have to increase to cover the additional costs and therefore you would be paying for the same service twice. We have regularly contacted the developers requesting them to put pressure on their contractors to improve the open green areas. I am sure you know from personal experience that they are hard to communicate with but we do continue to try.

The Parish Council has installed two noticeboards, a grit bin and three dog waste bins in this part of the parish however negotiations proved to be very difficult with the developer and additional dog waste bins were not permitted by them. The Parish Council has also agreed to take on the ownership and ongoing maintenance of all street lights but this transfer of responsibility cannot take place legally until the roads have been adopted.

Turning to the Summer Fete several requests were made for volunteers to come forward to join the organising committee. Unfortunately nobody from the Wootton area came forward or expressed any interest. Please do come along and get involved, we really do want to support community cohesion and all areas of our geographically large parish join together as one.

### Fraud

We are aware of a fraud happening in PIDDINGTON, whereby an elderly couple were convinced to hand over a substantial amount of money by people claiming to be from the Police.

The couple were contacted by person(s) claiming to be from the Police, who convinced the couple to take a quantity of money out from a foreign exchange and then claimed the money they had taken out was counterfeit, and sent a courier to collect it. This was at significant financial loss to the elderly couple.

### **Roque Traders**

The Parish Council has been made aware that roque traders have been active in the HACKLETON area.

The trader called at the home address of an elderly occupant and offered to clean some gutters; they charged the resident £200 for the works completed.

### **Recreation Ground**

The play equipment installation is progressing well.

### Land at The Green, Great Houghton

Roy Hawkesford attended the Visioning Workshop on 13 July 2023

You may be aware that Land at The Green is an 800 house project south of Great Houghton village, south of Brackmills Industrial Estate. It is a 40-hectare sausage shaped agricultural site in open countryside, separated from the existing village by the Ecological Enhancement Area. It is, basically, landlocked and served by tiny roads off the B526 and through the village to the A428. Like us, Gt Houghton has a Neighbourhood Plan (since 2022) and much reference was made to the fact.

### An exercise in futility?

I admit that I attended the workshop session in a sceptical frame of mind, sensing that it would be a "We want to hear what you have to say (but we'll do what we want anyway)" four-hour. The session was run by Homes England, a public body, sponsored by the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities, with the intention of speeding up the pace of house building across the country. As the project is already in WNC Local Plan Part 2, we were there not to debate whether or not it should go ahead, but to help form the 'vision' on what it will look like and how it will work.

The biggest difference between Homes England and previous largescale development organisations is that they follow through the whole process from Outline Planning and Reserved Matters through to the end; in short, they control the whole development and make sure that what is agreed is delivered by the developer.

In case you're wondering what this has to do with Hackleton Parish, just look at the map and you will see the relationship between the above site and the latest one on the radar, "Hardingstone Rise", a site for 1000 houses between that one and the B526, which would eventually comprise housing all the way along the north side of the B526 from Wootton to Preston Deanery.

### The big issues


While there was discussion about facilities, the environment, housing type, etc, by far the biggest topic was – you guessed it – roads and public transport. Not being fobbed off with "Oh, people will use bicycles, e-scooters and even walk to work" (at Brackmills, presumably?), we made it clear that cars would add at least 1600 more cars to the existing road network. Any notion that public transport would be provided evaporated early on in the discussion.

As well as the environmental impact, the link roads are narrow and unsuitable for larger volumes of traffic, lorries and buses. There was no clear plan to how the new site would be linked to the two main roads, except for, possibly, a new road through Brackmills. The impact on the B526 was reiterated, as well as the knock-on effect through Wootton to the A45 and M1. This would be considerably worse if Hardingstone Rise were to be built! Especially during construction, would the preferred route from our villages into Northampton be along Brafield Road and Bedford Road?

Another issue regarding the site at Gt Houghton was how it would identify itself. It's in open countryside, not directly linked to the village; unless it had sufficient facilities would it not – like Wootton Fields – identify with Wootton, putting pressure on an already well-used centre?

In terms of traffic, none of the above will appeal to the residents of our villages. How Homes England will get round the issues raised, I have no idea... and I don't think they do either. But their task is to deliver houses, in this case a dormitory estate with a poor road network and no public transport. Yes, they will have full control over the development and they did listen to what we had to say; I just hope they deliver and not leave us even more sceptical than we were beforehand.

## I've actually gone and done it!

Lindsay Cox reports on her epic cycle ride from London to Paris

Just over 300 miles on a bike from Greenwich Park to The Eiffel Tower and £1880 raised for Cure Leukaemia and I couldn't be happier or more proud of myself.

A few months ago this was just a crazy idea but I can honestly say I've just had the best four days I could have hoped for and I will never forget it.

The highlight for me was riding into Paris on a sunny Sunday afternoon, the streets and cafes were overflowing with people enjoying their afternoon and not expecting to see 170+ riders, all dressed identically in yellow tops, to come riding past two by two. We were led in on closed roads by lead cars and motorcycle escort amid cheering crowds all the way up to the Eiffel Tower. My smile could not have been bigger and any aches or pains I may have had over the last four days were forgotten.

Three days earlier we left Greenwich Park at 7.30am on a very chilly Thursday morning. This was my first time riding in a group of more than a few people and, together with riding through the streets of London in rush hour, I was understandably very nervous. We were split into 4 groups with our group consisting of around 60 riders. Once out into the Kent countryside I relaxed and started to enjoy myself.

75 miles and many new friends later we arrived arrived in Folkestone ready to board the Eurostar to Calais. Our bikes were handed over and once in Calais we boarded coaches to be taken to our hotels for dinner and a very welcome bed, ready for the very early start in the morning for our next day – Calais to Abbeville.

The following three days in France were amazing, very hilly, extremely hot, so much fun, unbelievably organised and also very moving at times. Each day we rode in our groups until the last 15 miles or so when we would all ride as one huge group into the destination for that day.

The last day in Paris was unimaginable and I will never forget it.

On the evening of the last day we all attended the Gala Dinner hosted by Cure Leukaemia. It was here we watched videos, heard very moving stories and met some incredibly brave people who have had personal experience of blood cancer, either themselves or by people close to them. We also heard from Matt Gant who ran the full distance in five days rather than four. He ran three full marathons a day for four days and then one last marathon on day five to meet us at the Eiffel Tower at the same time. Matt had lost his son at the age of 6 years old only a short time ago. It was stories like this that made the whole event incredibly real and worthwhile.

I must now say a very huge thank you to everyone who donated. My target was £1500 and I have raised almost £400 more than that. I moved to Hackleton




The event in total so far has raised a massive £230,000 and the funds are still coming in. Donations are still being accepted until September this year if anyone is interested.



### Ready, Set, Read!

West Northants libraries launch sport-themed Summer Reading Challenge

This summer, children aged 4 to 11 can visit any West Northamptonshire Library to join a superstar team and their marvellous mascots and get involved in a Summer Reading Challenge themed around the power of play, sport, games and physical activity.

The Challenge, which launches on Saturday, 8 July, invites children to read six books over the summer holidays whilst tracking their reading via a fictional summer obstacle course – brought to life by children's author and illustrator Loretta Schauer.

Participants will be rewarded with a medal and certificate upon completing the challenge. The Library Service has also partnered with local leisure centres to provide a voucher entitling children to a free swim or badminton, table tennis or squash court hire, depending on location.

The Challenge runs until Saturday, 9 September and aims to increase children's reading engagement and confidence whilst supporting their health and wellbeing and introducing families to their local library. Cllr Adam Brown said: "This summer we are inviting children to swap screen time and smartphones for reading books. Research shows reading in children can 'dip' over the summer months and we want to help change that.

"By participating in the challenge, young people will have the opportunity to explore new reading material, develop skills, and discover new interests whilst also keeping active.

"It's free to take part and I would encourage families across West Northamptonshire to sign up and discover the many books and services available in our local libraries."



### The Parish Council has been made aware that ROGUE TRADERS have been active in the Hackleton area.

The trader called at the home address of an elderly occupant and offered to clean some gutters; they charged the resident £200 for the works completed.

Rogue traders will often use common tactics such as props to convince occupants that there is a problem with their properties which need urgent attention. This can include buckets containing broken roof tiles, debris/ rubble, nests or dead birds to suggest that they have come from their roof space

Rogue traders tend to be quite assertive, albeit very pleasant to start with, and will happily walk homeowners around the exterior of their properties, pointing out elements of work which need attention. Once they have convinced the homeowner that work needs to be carried out, they will always escalate the original quote, manufacture extra work or offer to take them to a bank or cash machine to withdraw money. If you or someone you know finds themselves in such a situation and have any doubts, please call the police.

Please be vigilant for potential rogue traders operating and encourage elderly or vulnerable relatives to call you should any tradesman insist work needs to be carried out or are demanding money.



### How to spot a doorstep scam

- Someone knocks on your door that you weren't expecting warning that there's a problem with your roof or driveway that needs to be fixed without delay
- You're asked to make a payment upfront for work to be carried out
- You're convinced to go to your bank branch and withdraw money whilst they set up
- Additional problems are identified for which additional money is needed immediately

### **Always remember**

- Never disclose your PIN or let anyone persuade you to hand over your bank card, financial information or withdraw cash
- Don't feel pressured. Don't agree to hand over money at the door. Take time to think about it and talk to someone you trust
- Only let someone in if you're expecting them or they're a trusted friend, family member or professional. Don't feel embarrassed about turning someone away
- Check their credentials. You should always check someone's credentials – a genuine person won't mind. You can phone the company they represent or check online, but never used contact details they give you
- Take the time to think about any offer, even if it's genuine. Don't be embarrassed to say 'no' or ask them to leave (always get different quotes)
- Call 999 if you feel threatened or in danger. Call the police non-emergency number 101 if you're not in immediate danger but want to report an incident

### **Hackleton and Piddington Feasts**

Annual village feasts started on the second Sunday in July when the children had a week's holiday from school. Maureen Williams brings us this account of proceedings in Hackleton in 1881 as reported in the Northampton Mercury.

'The Feast has come and passed away. It made its appearance even before it was due, by the erection of merry-go-rounds, swings &c. On the Sunday two sermons were preached in the Baptist Chapel by the Rev. G. J. Moore, of Northampton, on behalf of the Sunday-schools, the proceeds of the collection going to the School Fund. There was the usual influx of visitors of nearly all ages, who generally make a practice of paying us a friendly visit during this season. The fact is, the feast seems more and more a week of arrangements for holidays of various kinds, for nearly every day now brings forth several forms of amusement; in fact, so numerous are the events that there has to be more than one for each day or they could not all be attended in one week. To give a detailed list would perhaps be advisable:

There followed a list which included a cricket match, the Co-op anniversary tea, followed by sports, with the Piddington and Hackleton brass band 'in attendance', the annual tea for the Baptist Chapel Sunday-school pupils, a picnic in Salcey Forest and a public tea. The festivities finished on the Saturday with dancing to the Northampton Band.


The events were not always popular with residents, however. In 1890 the Mercury reported that the Hardingstone Highways Board had received a complaint: 'from certain of the inhabitants of Piddington calling attention to the nuisance caused by owners of stalls, &c., at Piddington Feast. The vendors placed their stalls near the Wesleyan Chapel, and are there all day on Sunday at the Feast. The language used in connection with the fun of the fair is objected to by the attendants at the chapel and by the inhabitants of the adjoining cottages. – The Clerk was empowered to see Supt Alexander on the matter'.



The late Iris Sanders (née Longland) recalled that travelling showman Mr Strudwick would bring his caravans to Dairy Farm for the feast in the late 1920s and set up stalls on the field behind Russell Cottage, and once, when the field hadn't been harvested, in the farmyard itself. There would be stalls selling sweets and toys, a coconut shy, a shooting gallery, a barrel organ and a roundabout. Iris recalled: "I remember watching Granny Strudwick make 'spit-rock'. This was delicious cinder toffee, but she would spit on her hands as she worked, throwing the toffee to get long strands, hence the name."

Henry Arthur Strudwick, also known as Harry or Cockney Harry was born in London in 1862. He married Emily Hood who was from a fairground family in Berkshire. Harry spent most of his life touring Northamptonshire and the surrounding counties with his carousels, swing boats and games like 'Aunt Sally'. The family (he and Emily had ten children) spent the winter months in Burton Latimer. When Harry died in 1932 his second youngest son, John (1899 – 1994) took over the business, and this was the Mr Strudwick that Iris remembered.

Cllr Adam Brown, Deputy Leader of WNC and Cabinet Member for Housing, Culture and Leisure, said: "We're really pleased to be able to provide Trilogy Active with this funding to deliver these important activities which will benefit residents across Northampton.

"Sport and physical activity play a vital role in our communities and are enormously important in helping people's physical and mental health and wellbeing.



"I encourage everybody to take advantage of these free programmes and take a look at the other offerings available in their local leisure centre."

Trilogy Active currently manages the Mounts Baths, Lings Forum Leisure Centre, Danes Camp Leisure Centre, the Cripps Recreation Centre, Duston Sports Centre and Berzerk in Northampton, and Trilogy Gym in Peterborough.

John Fletcher, Managing Director of Trilogy Active, said: "We are delighted to continue to receive this funding which will help make a real difference to people in Northampton.

"Our Wellbeing Walks, led by our trained volunteer walk leaders are a great way to meet new people and to give your health and wellbeing a boost. Our Northampton Streets Sports programme aims to create a positive change in the lives of young people across the town through the power of sport.




