Now, as usual, its used by about 20 of us locals on a weekly basis. There are people I see in our village who have never set foot in there which seems strange as what is a village without a pub other than a smaller version of a housing estate?

I have no intention of dictating how people should run their lives but would point out that during Covid it became really apparent how a pub can be the hub of just a place to chat, have a drink and catch up with fellow villagers.

I have no idea as to the tangible benefits or negatives of 11 houses being built at the top of my road, but I do know that one day, when that lovely building is gone, this village will be the poorer for it when all we have is just a collection of houses . . .

Parish Council Notes

10 October 2023

Alison Benson Clerk to the Council

The Parish Council met on the 10th October 2023. Seven councillors were present together with the Parish Clerk.

Planning Development

West Northants Council is expected to publish a draft new Local Plan in early 2024. The Plan will adopt areas of land for development which may or may not be within or close to our parish. The Parish Council has therefore agreed to put in place a budget of £2000.00 from general reserves to obtain professional advice and guidance to ensure it is well placed to robustly respond to the consultation on the draft Local Plan. The advice sought will look to ensure that our Hackleton Neighbourhood Plan is up to date following the recent publication of a new National Planning Framework and provide guidance about how to respond to the draft Local Plan. A working party will also be set up to review the draft Local Plan once it is published.

St George's Fields

Volunteers urgently needed to deliver the Parish Mag' to St George's Fields. Unfortunately without volunteers to deliver the Parish Mag' the Parish Council will have no option but to suspend deliveries which would be such a shame and very much a last resort.

Recreation Ground Play Equipment

To ensure that the new play equipment is kept in excellent condition and all heath and safety requirements are fully met a five-year maintenance plan will be entered into with Hags to carry out quarterly maintenance inspections. These inspections will be in addition to our own weekly visual inspections.

Memorial Testing

The Memorial Testing Procedure has been reviewed and Memorial Testing will be undertaken in Piddington Cemetery and Churchyard during November 2023. (See separate item in this Mag').







The road belongs to the Chambers family

Firstly, prior to our buying most of what was the former land of the Martin family in 1951and then known as Church Farm, there was only a narrow dirt track leading to Salcey Forest between what was two fields which gave a public right of way to Salcey Forest and the nearby footpaths and bridleways.

Following our purchase of all the land bar the proposed building site which at the time was a pasture field owned by Bert Fitzhugh who raised cattle there until the late 1980's, we created what is now known as New Farm and installed the tarmac road into what is now the farm vard. Our water meter was installed on the edge of our property boundary, just outside 99 Forest Road. This is further confirmation that we own the road, as Anglian Water could not install our meter on someone else's land. We also own the wet ditch that runs along the western side of the single track road all the way down to Martins Road. Anglian Water have confirmed they have no assets or any adopted land forming the wet ditch. We, as the land owners of the adjacent field, are responsible for its upkeep and maintenance – we have been doing this since 1951.

During the 1950's not all land was registered with the land registry at the time of purchase and even to this day we have had land registered in recent years that we have owned since 1951.

WNC can claim what they like but they cannot adopt land that has never belonged to them or been installed or maintained by them and they will be in for a very prolonged and expensive court battle to prove ownership if they decide to go down the route of claiming ownership. Hopefully the possibility of legal action over ownership will make WNC see sense. They have no evidence of ownership and any "adoption" of land not owned by them is tantamount to theft.

We also own the byeway up to the entrance of Salcey Forest although public access is permitted.

The farm houses were built in around 1962 to provide housing for farm workers at New Farm and also the Poultry business built there to replace that at Church

As the surrounding farm land came up for sale, my late grandfather purchased it to add to the family agricultural estate which originally encompassed Church farm, New Farm, Home Farm, Manor farm, Piddington Grange and lastly Horton Grange, leaving just the pasture field in front of the New Farm entrance which was of little use to us and so Bert Fitzhugh continued to graze his cattle there and we allowed access for agricultural purposes into the field off our tarmac road.

The single track has never been adopted by WNC and they have failed to produce any documentary evidence to show any proof of ownership.

They were also unable to produce any evidence when requested of installing the tarmac single track road!

We won't make the same mistake twice

When Grafton Court was built, we gave permission for a fee for them to connect surface water drainage into our "wet" ditch as it was a small scale affordable housing. In hindsight, due to the poor drainage throughout Forest Road provided by Anglian water we now think was probably a bad idea but hindsight is a wonderful thing.

However we were approached by this new developer some months ago about not only connecting into the "wet" ditch for the new self build development but also potentially piping across the fields to the adjacent ditch at Horton and were told that permission would not be granted — at any price!

Not a suitable location

The development is outside the village boundary and building within 50m of a working busy farm and haulage company is ludicrous especially when all the houses will have to use cars as there is no public

transport and our whole community would be at great risk of flooding not to mention the affect it has on local wildlife as we narrow the buffer zone between Piddington and Salcey Forest.

Farms are noisy places and we have worked the land and have lived here since 1951 with 24 hour 365 days a year useage. In addition, our haulage company, that has traded from here since 2001 has been granted the same operational hours.

It's simply not conducive to have housing so close to this busy operation. Our New Farm Airfield which operates within permitted development rights will only cause potential future distress to all concerned.

Unsuitable development

The types of housing planned are not what a rural village like ours needs - affordable housing is the main requirements. Also, there is no infrastructure to support this development.

We want to keep our village as a rural community and have for the past 70 plus years allowed minimal building to take place within the village on land previously owned by ourselves as custodians of the local land and working to preserve the beauty and character of our village.

Everything we have done is carefully planned with everyone's needs considered and we try to keep everyone happy where possible.

James Paterson from WNC has confirmed that WNC do not own or have not at any time adopted the single track road and confirmed that they understand that we widened the original track and surfaced it when New Farm was created in the 1950's.

However Mr Paterson pointed out that the road is recognised as a "Highway" whether a dirt track or surfaced road and whether privately owned or not and has been for many centuries.

We have never disputed public access via our road to access the byway to Salcey Forest or the nearby footpaths and bridleways near to it - have no problem with access for the general public.

Our concern is that WNC cannot grant permission for an adjacent land owner to exit onto privately owned land or connect into privately owned surface drainage.


The original owner of the grass field who bought it from the Martin estate, which was sold due to death duties, was granted permision to enter/exit onto the "hiway" via the field gate for agricultural purposes and no other.

Hopefully WNC will now see sense and agree that as no permission has been granted by the land owner for a private developer to enter/exit this field and that change of use will need to be granted and permissions sought before any such development could be considered, we can protect this area of our rural community for future generations to enjoy.



Community Speed Watch

Horton and Hackleton

Over a four week period, starting mid August, a group of volunteers from Horton, Hackleton and Piddington took part in the first Community Speed Watch in our Parish.

Small teams conducted fourteen one hour sessions, monitoring traffic on Brafield Road and the Main Road in Hackleton during the morning and evening rush hour period as well as weekends.

The table below shows a summary of the data recorded.

One thing we all experienced during these sessions was the notable change in driver behaviour and the positive impact on the average speed the team's presence had, similar to what we see when the mobile camera van is active in the Parish. Despite the fact we were highly visible and motorists were being warned by others flashing etc we can see a lot of motorists still considered it acceptable to drive past in excess of 35mph! One driver even thought it was ok to overtake in front of us in Hackleton!

Having monitored both roads at the same time of day it was interesting to see the big difference in the volume of traffic, with Brafield Road by far the busiest as it has now become a popular cut through for motorists commuting to Milton Keynes and the surrounding area.

As expected we did get the odd motorist who felt compelled to express their disapproval but what was nice and really encouraging was all the positive reactions from the local community, with some people even taking time to stop and chat, share their experiences and show their support. We even gained a couple of new recruits for the current and future sessions.

The fact we took part shows the motorists who use the roads through our villages that the local community are taking road safety seriously and hopefully some, and those especially who received warning letters, will think about their speed in the future.

I would like to end by saying a big thank you to all the volunteers who came out to support this initiative, and for giving up their valuable time to participate in the surveillance sessions. It is very much appreciated.

On 25 November one of our own will be pirouetting out of his comfort zone to raise funds for our local hospice.







Having your car broken into and losing your things to thieves can be very distressing. Here are a few simple steps you can take to keep your vehicle, and what's in it, safe.

1. Always lock it

Fueling up or popping back into your house to get something are perfect examples of how easy it is to turn your back for a moment and forget your vehicle is unsecured. So get into the habit of locking your vehicle even if you're only going to be away from it for a moment.

If your vehicle has wing mirrors that fold in automatically when locked, make sure you lock it properly. Criminal gangs are looking for vehicles like these where the wing mirrors are still out because it is clear to them that the vehicle has been left unlocked.

2. Close windows and the sun roof to prevent 'fishing'

Leaving windows and the sunroof open invites fishing for items through the gap by hand or with, say, a bent coat hanger, which could also be used to unlock a door for them to get in. Thieves can be ingenious. Don't give them the opportunity.

3. Secure your number plates with tamperresistant screws

The easiest way to change the identity of a stolen vehicle or avoid speeding tickets and parking tickets is to fit stolen number plates. Using security screws to attach your vehicle's number plates makes it harder for thieves to get your number.

4. Fit locking, anti-tamper wheel nuts to secure alloy wheels

Stolen wheels are valuable, either as parts or for their scrap value. Using locking wheel nuts reduces the risk of your vehicle's wheels being stolen.

Secure anything that's on the outside of your vehicle

Anything left on roof-racks, tailgate racks, holiday top boxes or in tool chests are easily stolen when the vehicle is parked. The use of cable locks, padlocks and self-locking tools chests, which are secured to the vehicle, makes them more secure, but still, don't leave things in them if you can avoid it.

6. Take it with you or hide it

Your mobile phone, coins for the car park, sunglasses, packs of medication or other items that can earn quick cash are irresistible to the opportunist thief. Remember, the cost of replacing a window is often much more than that of what's stolen. And it should go without saying that wallets, handbags, purses and credit cards should never be left in an unattended vehicle.

7. Hide electrical items and leave no clues

Leaving sat nav mounts, suction cup marks on windows or cables on view gives it away that you have left a Sat Nav, smartphone or other device in your car. Even if they can't see the Sat Nav or iPad they might still break in to see if it's stored in the car, out of sight.

8. Tool theft from vans

Vans are often targeted by thieves for the tools stored inside. If you have to leave tools in a van overnight,

it's a good idea to mark them clearly with your name / company name and address using paint pens and seal with a clear lacquer spray. Alternatively, you can use a variety of other property marking systems. Items that are clearly marked are less desirable and more difficult to sell on.

Consider using a lockable cabinet within your van to store tools — a number of security rated products are available. Small cameras are also designed to record inside vehicles. Visit Secured by Design for more details.

You can also take photographs of items of value, make a note of the serial numbers and consider registering them online at a property register site.

9. Park in well-lit, busier areas

It can take less than 30 seconds to break into a vehicle. Parking in well-lit areas and busy streets increases the chances of a thief being seen, so they'll probably steer clear.

10. Take your documents

Having a vehicle's registration and insurance documents could let a thief pretend to be the owner. Which means they could sell it on quite easily. So, never leave any documents in the vehicle.

11. Choose your car park wisely

If possible, always try to park in well-lit and staffed car parks or those with a Park Mark safer parking award. To find one, simply check out **Park Mark**.

Wooden Crosses

In the cremated remains area nearest to the church porch

Many of the crosses in the above area are in poor condition and it is not possible to mow the grass properly. Churchyard Regulations also state that the installation of wooden crosses after an interment of ashes is a temporary measure and that they shall be removed once a permanent memorial stone has been installed.

Therefore in order to comply with the Regulations it is necessary for:

All wooden crosses to be removed from the cremated remains area nearest the church by Thursday 30th November 2023

Families are encouraged to personally remove the wooden crosses of their loved ones before 30th November.

Any crosses not removed by 30th November will be taken away and stored until 7th January 2024 when they will be taken to a recycling centre.

Memorial Safety Testing

Memorial Safety Testing will be undertaken during November 2023.

All memorials will be subject to a visual inspection looking for signs of decay, e.g. loose or cracked cement. All memorials will be given a hand test where it is deemed safe to do so following the visual inspection. The Council will not utilise a mechanical method of testing (topple test) as these instruments are liable to overestimate the actual risk.

The Parish Council recognises that the inspection programme has the potential to cause distress, particularly where action is required and will aim to contact known memorial owners as quickly as possible to discuss any issues. If any memorial is deemed at immediate risk and the memorial owner is not known, clear information will be posted in the burial ground. A notice will be placed on or near the memorial, giving contact details and the period in which the contact should be made. Where the grave owner is known, the Council will contact them by letter to give them the opportunity to repair the memorial.

Headmaster Edward Lyne

More local insight from the latest book by Maureen Williams

The original church school in Piddington, at the bottom of Forest Road, closed on 25th March 1875 'the Managers being unable under voluntary managements to provide funds for its maintenance.' A new School Board was formed later that year and the school re-opened in the November. Edward Lyne started work as the master in December, and his new wife Elizabeth was the sewing mistress. Two years later the school moved into a brand-new building on Main Road, Hackleton, although officially it continued to be called Piddington School until 1906.

Edward was born in 1854 in Devizes, Wiltshire, but was brought up in Berkshire where his father worked as a coach smith, making and repairing the metal parts of carriages. The young Edward did well at school, going on to become a pupil teacher in Reading. He married Elizabeth Allen of Reading in 1874. The young couple probably lived in Piddington before moving into the new schoolhouse in Hackleton.

Edward retired in 1919 after 44 years at the helm, and he and Elizabeth went to live with their youngest son, John at 2 Main Road, Hackleton, where John, or Jack as he was known, ran a garage and cycle shop which also sold tobacco and confectionery — it is now Hackleton Stores. Edward died in 1942, but Elizabeth lived for another nine years, dying at the ripe old age of 95.

Jack became chairman of the school managers after his father retired, served on the parish and rural district councils, and was the ARP warden for the village during the Second World War, as well as being a churchwarden for many years. A keen sportsman, he was also chairman of Hackleton Football Club and president of Horton House Cricket Club.






