

Parish Council Notes

13 February 2024

Alison Benson Clerk to the Council

The Parish council met on 13th February when ten councillors were present together with Unitary Councillor Fiona Cole, one member of the public and the Parish Clerk

Highways/Road Safety

Following flooding from Great Lane across Main Road we asked highways to look at the drains in the area. They re-cleansed 41 drains and found all but 2 to be fully operational.

The Parish Council is to purchase 3 cut out people signs to try and reduce speeding outside the School.

A Working Party is to be set up the look at highway and road safety issues around the parish.

An application for double yellow lines in some parts of the parish has been considered. At this time no application will be made for double yellow lines but advice from WNC Parking Enforcement and the Police Safer Roads Team will be sought.

Speed data is to be downloaded from our Speed Indicator Devices so that we can be clear about the extent of the issues.

Community Speedwatch

Our volunteer group will have the Speedwatch equipment from 25th May until 22nd June. We really do need more volunteers so please get in touch **clerk@hackletonparishcouncil.gov.uk** if you can spare a few hours during the above dates.

Recreation Ground

We continue to liaise with Hags regarding the outstanding snagging issues with the new play equipment.

The pedestrian gate into the Recreation Ground from Main Road will be replaced with a new metal gate in early March. Additional hedge plants have been established in the hedge line at the front of the Recreation Ground. Residents are asked to please respect the hedge and use the gate at all times.

Dog fouling is becoming a big issue and the Parish Council will undertake a campaign requesting residents pick-up after their dogs at all times. If things don't improve then the Parish Council may have no option but to ban dogs. Dogs must also be kept on a lead around the play equipment at all times.

Concerns were raised about recent vandalism and graffiti in the Football Shelter. The graffiti has been covered up but there is an awful lot of work for our part time Groundsman to clean the benches of paint etc.

Longland Meadow

A gate is to be installed at bottom entrance to the Meadow to stop dogs escaping onto the footpath.



Wildlife, Biodiversity and Environment



A Gift of Seeds

Enhance your garden with natural beauty — promote biodiversity and attract wildlife.

Wildflowers provide bees, butterflies and other pollinators with food throughout the year. On a single day in summer, one acre of wildflower meadow can contain 3 million flowers, producing 1kg of nectar sugar. That's enough to support nearly 96,000 honey bees per day.

As part of our wildlife, biodiversity and environment initiatives you will find attached to this edition of the Mag' a packet of wildflower seeds for you to plant. The mixture includes: Corn Chamomile, Corncockle, Cornflower, Corn Marigold and Corn Poppy.

When to sow

Try to sow your seeds just after the last expected frost, the ideal germination temperature is 15-21°C. Germination takes 1-5 weeks but will be erratic. Thin seedlings if required and water if the ground dries out.

We hope that the seeds will create a long lasting, wildflower meadow right across our parish, enhancing your gardens with natural beauty. By adding native wildflowers into a small area of your garden you will provide more food for pollinators like bees and butterflies, as well as other insects.

What is an e-scooter?

Electrical scooters (also known as e-scooters) come under the category of "powered transporters"; this covers a range of personal transport devices which are powered by a motor.

E-scooters are classed as motor vehicles under the Road Traffic Act 1988. Which means the rules that apply to motor vehicles, also apply to e-scooters including the need to have a licence, insurance and tax.

It's not currently possible to get insurance for privately owned e-scooters, which means it's illegal to use them on the road or in public spaces. If you're using a private e-scooter you risk the vehicle being seized under S.165 Road Traffic Act 1988 for no insurance.

If you cause serious harm to another person whilst riding an e-scooter the incident will be investigated in the same way it would if you were riding a motorcycle or driving a car.

Legal use of an e-scooter

It's legal to use an e-scooter on private land with the permission of the land owner.

Where a trial rental scheme is running, it's legal to use a rental e-scooter on a public road or cycle lane, provided you have the correct licence and follow road traffic regulations.

Rental e-scooter trials

Trials of rental e-scooters are taking place in the UK. Anyone using a rental e-scooter on a public road or other public space, has to comply with the relevant road traffic legislation or they face potential prosecution.

To rent an e-scooter you must:

- meet the minimum age limit; these can vary depending on the provider, so please check with them
- hold the correct driving licence (category Q or P/M)
- create an account with the rental company

E-scooters can only be used in approved areas.

Penalties and offences

If you don't have a licence, or the correct licence, or are riding without insurance you could face a Fixed Penalty notice:

- with a £300 fine and six penalty points on your licence for having no insurance
- up to £100 fine and three to six penalty points for riding without the correct licence

You could also be committing an offence if you're caught:

- riding on a pavement; Fixed Penalty Notice and possible £50 fine
- using a mobile phone or other handheld mobile device while riding; £200 and six penalty points
- riding through red lights; Fixed Penalty Notice, £100 fine and possible penalty points
- drink driving: the same as if you were driving a car. you could face court imposed fines, a driving ban and possible imprisonment

If you're using an e-scooter in public in an antisocial manner, you can also risk the e-scooter being seized under section 59 of the Police Reform Act.

When riding an e-scooter, we would always recommend wearing safety protection such as a helmet and to keep to the speed limit.

Could you help Toads on Roads?

Mary Hopper with a plea for help for our Piddington toads



Did you know Piddington is a hotspot for Toads on Roads? On mild, damp evenings from early February through to April, toads return to their spawning grounds to breed. Long-term villagers may remember toads crossing Piddington Lane in their hundreds or even thousands, but numbers have dropped rapidly in recent years as so many fall victim to passing cars. In 2016 The Wildlife Trust found UK toad populations had declined by 68% over 30 years. Since then, they've been further devastated by recent hot summers drying up ponds and other amphibian habitats, so that number is now likely much higher.

As we've had a few weeks of wet weather, a small number of toads are once again attempting to cross Piddington Lane and Forest Road as they strive to get back to their family home. After dark they can be hard to spot, with only their pale chests showing up in car headlights. They may look like fallen leaves but if

drivers slow down and put lights on full beam (when safe to do so), it's sometimes possible to avoid them. Toads like to travel on mild nights (5°C+), especially when it's been raining, so if you're driving in or out of Piddington please slow down and keep an eye out in case they can be safely avoided.

Another way we can help our toads is in partnership with a charity called **Froglife**. Their **Toads on Roads** project has Piddington Lane registered as a 'migratory crossing' and they can help us coordinate a local Toad Patrol if a few community members are willing to give up some time for toads. Patrols can access materials to complete a risk assessment and advice on how to safely help toads across, as well as each registered member being covered by Froglife's public liability and personal injury insurance. Patrols can also apply to their local council for road warning signs to be installed and actively help the toads across the road, such as

Why did the toad cross the road?

Common Toads are very particular about where they breed and often migrate back to their ancestral breeding ponds each year. They follow the same route, regardless of what gets in their way, which sometimes leads to them crossing roads. We get a toad vs. traffic scenario and the toads inevitably come off worse. Thousands are killed crossing roads each spring as they make their way to breeding ponds that they have used for generations.

The **Toads on Roads** project registers these sites as 'migratory crossings' and helps coordinate local Toad Patrols. Patrols can apply to their local council for road warning signs to be installed and actively help the toads across the road. The Toads on Roads project has been running for over twenty years and numerous crossings have been recognised nationwide.

Although you can volunteer as much or as little as you like, patrol managers do need commitment and enthusiasm. Toad patrolling is not a one-off event. Migration can run from as early as January to as late as April and will include going out in the evenings in wet conditions.

by potentially installing crossing tunnels. The Toads on Roads project has been running for over 20 years and collects information on how many toads are rescued and killed each year, providing much-needed data to support conservation efforts nationwide.

So if you feel you could don a hi-vis vest, bring a bucket and brave a damp evening for the sake of our toads, please get in touch with the Parish Council and hopefully we can get our own Toad Patrol on the move. Take a look at www.froglife.org/what-we-do/toads-on-roads to see how we can help toads rebuild their numbers and thrive in our villages once again.

Piddington Toad Patrol

If you've lived in Piddington for any length of time, you're probably aware of toads on the road at the top of Piddington Lane at this time of year. In recent years environmental conditions have dramatically reduced the number of toads attempting this dangerous road trip but with more favourable weather conditions this year, there has been an increase in numbers. Unfortunately in all road traffic incidents involving cars and toads, the toad always comes off worse. **The toads need our help**.

Can you spare some time to help local toads cross Piddington Lane?

Volunteers are needed to help a Piddington 'Toads on Roads' patrol on mild, wet evenings in February and March. All you'll need for patrolling is warm clothes, something reflective, a bucket and a torch. You can take part as little or as often as you like.








Tales from the Villages

The last of the Gunning Baronets?

This is the first story in a new series of 'Tales from the Villages' by local historian, Maureen Williams.

A new headstone was erected in Horton churchyard last year, following the burial of the ashes of Sir Charles Theodore Gunning, 9th Bt, who died in Canada in 2020. The stone also commemorates his parents, Sir Robert (whose original headstone it replaces) and Lady Ann, and other members of the family.

Horton Hall (demolished in 1936) was home to the Gunning baronets from 1782 until 1888, when the estate was sold by Sir George Gunning, 5th Bt, who moved into Little Horton House on Brafield Road. Even though the later baronets no longer lived at Horton, like their predecessors they are all buried in the churchyard, most of their graves lining one side of the path to the church.

Sir Robert was born in 1901 on the island of Lamu, Kenya, where his father Charles Archibald Gunning was a colonial official. Being a great-grandson of the youngest of six sons born to Sir George Gunning, 2nd Bt, Robert probably never expected to inherit the baronetcy.

Educated at St Paul's School, London and Leeds University, he made his fortune as a goldminer in West Africa before marrying Helen Nancy (Ann) Hallet, daughter of Vice Admiral Theodore Hallett, in 1934. After a brief return to Africa, they set up home in London where their first three children, Charles, Iseult and Marion were born. When the Horton Estate was sold in 1935 after the death of Harold Winterbottom. they purchased the former stables (now Captain's Court), took up residence in 1937 or '38, and started a market garden business in the old walled kitchen garden, now the location of The Nurseries and Gunning Court.



Sadly, their daughter Marion drowned in the estate's outdoor swimming pool in 1939, aged just 19 months. She too is buried in the churchyard and remembered on the headstone.

The Second World War found Robert serving in the 50th (Northamptonshire Regiment) Anti-Aircraft Battalion, Royal Engineers, reaching the rank of Temporary Captain. The 1939 Register, created at the start of the war, shows Ann, who was expecting their fourth child at the time, occupying the house with her two surviving children, a cook, house parlourmaid and children's nurse/dairymaid. Also resident and helping Ann with the heavy work in the market garden, was Violet Halliday, the then owner of Preston Deanery Hall – but that's another story!

After the war, the couple struggled to make a success of their market garden business and, annoyed by some decisions made by the local planning authorities, they upped sticks and emigrated with their (by now) five children to Canada in 1948. They sailed from Southampton on the Cunard Line's RMS Aguitania (apart from Charles who joined them later; he was a very good cricketer, and his headmaster was allowed to keep him until the end of the season!) and settled in Peace River, Alberta. Incidentally, the Aguitania docked at Halifax, Nova Scotia, named after Sir George Montagu Dunk, 2nd Earl of Halifax, who owned the Horton Hall Estate before the Gunnings.

Robert became a successful landowner and farmer and inherited the baronetcy when Sir Charles Vere Gunning, 7th Bt died in 1950 with no male heir. By 1955 the couple had ten children. Charles inherited the title on his father's death in 1989, and Sir Robert's ashes were interred in Horton in accordance with his wishes.

Charles had joined the Royal Canadian Navy in the 1950s and served as an engineering officer on submarines for 28 years, rising to the rank of Lieutenant Commander. Well- respected, he was a consultant to the Canadian Navy for a further 30 years.

He had reserved a burial plot in Horton churchyard, probably in order to continue the family tradition, but perhaps also because, according to his widow, Lady Linda Gunning, he had fond memories of growing up in Horton; he was 13 when the family emigrated.

Charles had a daughter with his first wife Sarah, but they divorced in 1982, and there were no children from his second marriage to Linda Kachmar in 1989. Next in line to the title is his brother John, born in Horton in 1944, but he does not appear to have tried to prove his succession yet and the baronetcy is shown as 'vacant' on the Official Roll of the Baronetage, 2024.

There is a plot reserved in Horton churchyard for Lady Linda and a space left for her on the headstone, but we may have seen the last of the Gunning Baronets.


