

Get things off your chest!

The Lands **Pathway**

The Path from the Village Hall, Hackleton to St Johns Way, Piddington

It has been brought to the attention of Hackleton Parish Council that the tarmac path leading from the Village Hall, up past Longland Meadow and on to St Johns Way in Piddington, has fallen into disrepair in many places, with some areas having broken up, others rising from root growth underneath and others having been affected by the flooding that has taken place in recent years by the brook.

This pathway is the responsibility of the Highways Authority, and it has been raised with them that the path really needs to be resurfaced or at least having immediate repairs to the worst affected areas.

Unfortunately, this is outside the scope of the budget currently available and the latest machinery and technology available to them for the repairs of potholes in roads is too large for the width of the pathway and cannot be utilised.

The Parish Council has sought out the cost to have the path resurfaced and we have received a quotation from WNC Highways, in the sum of £11,847.04 plus costs. This is a cost the Parish Council cannot cover and

we therefore suggest that concerned residents raise the issue directly by making a report to the Highways Authority by logging their concerns on 'The Street Doctor' the link:

https://fix.westnorthants.gov.uk/

It is to be hoped that, if sufficient numbers of reports are made, this will increase the likelihood of action being taken sooner and before the state of repair of this important pathway worsens.



West Northants Draft Local Plan

Horses or Houses?

WNC makes a decision on this controversial Planning Application

Maz Woolley and Roy Hawkesford attended the planning meeting



The Application, featured in the Parish Mag last year, is for permission to construct "11 serviced plots for self-builders and public open space" on the southern edge of Piddington.

The application for developing a site infrastructure intended to allow the construction of eleven 'self-build' houses to the south of the Piddington village boundary went to the West Northamptonshire (South) Planning Committee on the 9th May. I attended the meeting with Parish Councillor Roy Hawkesford and took advantage of the opportunity to address the councillors for three minutes though I did find it a struggle to get all the points I wanted to make covered in that time. I was glad that I did speak to show that Residents were not in favour of the application as the development company had lined up a Planner and two people who claimed to be 'local' wanting to occupy some of the proposed sites. In the case of one of these people 'local' appeared to mean connections to Hartwell

and Northampton, the other did not define his local connections despite claiming to be a local supporter.

We were lucky to be pushing against an 'open door' on this occasion as the Council's Planning department had recommended refusal of the planning application with particular emphasis on the fact that the site is not sustainable as there is no available local employment, public transport, and the Planners disregarded the supporters claim that local facilities like the White Hart and shop were only a thirteen minute walk away and their claims for the Ability bus service which does not offer a full sustainable transport service.

The Planning Committee were minded to accept the recommendations of the officer and unanimously refused the application.

I believe that there are good grounds to reject this development but I am disappointed that the existing planning framework makes it very difficult for the Planning Team to take into account factors that we as villagers think are very important. For example, the traffic impact has to be 'severe' before traffic can be used as a reason for rejection. This is distressing given the game of 'Russian Roulette' we all play driving round the bend at the bottom of Forest Road with every fellow resident I talk to having their own story about meeting a car, van or lorry heading straight at them on a blind bend at speed. It would appear that the blind bend could only influence Highways recommendations decisions if a series of major accidents happen there and it is then recorded as an accident black spot.

During evidence from supporters of the proposal it emerged that the buildings to be built were unlikely to be the type of stylish wooden framed self-builds we see on TV shows but are likely to be, at least in part, factory built pre-fabricated houses which are then erected on site. In my mind this makes the whole application a turnkey project to enable a close of largely pre-fabricated houses directly adjacent to a working Farm.

I was also disappointed that the Planners did not strongly criticise the access and drainage elements of the scheme directly. The developer has failed to prove that the drainage ditch they propose to drain into has the capacity to take the outflow and that it drains away satisfactorily when its crosses others land. Locals know better than the Highways Authority and Anglian Water that water streams down Forest Road in heavy rain and overflows the drainage system. As neither Highways or Anglian are ever there to see this I suspect it is never officially recorded anywhere.

The fact that if the application went ahead a site full of family homes would be located next to a concrete apron often filled with large Farming Machinery and Heavy Lorries has not been given enough weight I believe. Indeed, a while ago a tracked military vehicle was parked opposite the proposed site and used from time to time. This is surely a safety risk for any children living in the scheme. The rejection also did not record

the fact that this development will be close to heavy duty grain drier that runs day and night during harvest and which is loud enough to be heard in Martins Road and Smith Close a full field away from the site. The potential impact on agricultural operations at the farm do not seem to have been given proper weight in the rejection either.

The site will also be very close to the landing strip operated on the other side of the farm buildings and under certain wind conditions the proposed site is already overflown by small aircraft and if the site is developed any residents will certainly hear them clearly as they will be located so close to the airstrip.

The West Northants Planner has rightly noted that no section 106 agreement has been agreed to control the self-build aspect of the scheme. It is conventional for local authorities to place legal restrictions on self-build sites which include restrictions on how soon the houses can be sold on to new users after build, requirements for local connections before being allowed to buy one of the sites, and other legal ties which genuine self-builders for their own use can easily live with but property developers greatly dislike as it delays their realisation of profit. I cannot see how any development for self-builds could be allowed anywhere in the County without a robust legal agreement that would bind all the plot buyers too.

There were indications that the Developers retained Planner was already rehearsing grounds for appealing against this decision, so residents need to keep their eyes open for an appeal or re-submission if the developers bankrolling this application decide to push this further.



D-DAY AND THE BATTLE OF NORMANDY

On D-Day, 6 June 1944, Allied Forces launched a combined naval, air and land assault on Nazioccupied France. Codenamed Operation 'Overlord', the Allied landings on the Normandy beaches marked the start of a long and costly campaign to liberate north-west Europe from German occupation. Early on 6 June, Allied airborne forces parachuted into drop zones across northern France. Ground troops then landed across five assault beaches — Utah, Omaha, Gold, Juno and Sword.

By the end of the day, the Allies had established a foothold along the coast and could begin their advance into France.

Tales from the Villages

The Horton Inn

Maureen Williams brings us the first instalment of a two-part story detailing the history of one of the parish's local landmarks



Horton Grange, pictured here in the early 1930s and now home to The French Partridge, was formerly a coaching inn and farmhouse. The oldest part of the house, on the right with the tall chimneys, was built in the late 1600s. At that time, there was a lane from Brafield to Eakley Lanes running past the inn, but the main highway from Northampton to Stoke Goldington and on to London ran through Piddington and along what is now a bridle path (London Lane), coming out south of Horton.

However, when the turnpike road was built in 1709, the route was diverted through Hackleton and Horton at the request of George Montagu (soon to become the 1st Earl of Halifax), who owned the Horton Estate on which the inn stood. The left section of the house was added in the mid-1700s, presumably to cater for the increased trade.

Originally known as the Horton Inn, it was often referred to as the Gunning's Arms after Sir Robert Gunning purchased the estate in 1782. It also functioned as a farm, with the farm buildings located on the other side of the London Road. Before The Drive was built in the mid-1800s, the main entrance to Horton Park and the Hall was via a carriage way in front of the inn and past the church.

The inn, together with 150 acres of land, was advertised 'To lett' in the Northampton Mercury in 1782. The advert read: 'The inn is a well-accuftomed one and in full Bufinefs; the Land is eligibly divided, and particularly adapted for taking in Droves of Cattle, which are very numerous on the Road, and have ufually ftopped here.' Every September the inn hosted the 'Statutes for the Hiring of Servants' - fairs where agricultural labourers would come to find work for the

coming year. It was also the venue for meetings of the Turnpike Trust, responsible for the maintenance of the road and the collection of tolls.

It appears that a Mr Whiting became the tenant in 1782. However, eight years later he announced that he was leaving but would continue to serve his customers at the Spread Eagle in Piddington.

The next known innkeeper was Charles Brown, formerly the landlord of the Old Coach and Horses at 'Hogstie' in Buckinghamshire (now Woburn Sands), who on 4th July 1800 'Begs Leave to inform his Friends and Cuftomers, that he has Taken and Entered on HORTON INN.'

His son, also called Charles, seems to have taken over from him in about 1815. Charles Jr and his wife Elizabeth had three sons, Robert, Thomas and Charles, who were all born and baptised in Horton. It must have been a busy hostelry in those days; in addition to the drovers, some 28 stagecoaches and mail coaches a day passed through the village on their journeys between London and the north, and many would have stopped there to change horses.

Charles Brown Sr died in 1836 aged 83, and Charles Jr died the following year, but Elizabeth continued to run the inn and the now 295-acre farm with the help of her sons, three live-in servants and seven farm workers. However, although they didn't reach Horton until the early 1870s, the development of the railways in the 1830s signalled the beginning of the end for stagecoach travel, and in 1853 an auction of brewing

equipment and '200 lots of useful household furniture' was advertised 'in consequence of the Inn being converted into a private residence.' By 1861 Elizabeth was living with her son Thomas and his family in Eakley Lanes.

Three years later 41-year-old farmer Hugh Higgins from Stoke Goldington became the tenant of Horton Inn Farm, and he and his family were still living in the former inn when the Horton Estate was put up for sale in 1887. The sales catalogue describes it as 'a very superior farm residence, with lawn and pleasure grounds.' The ground floor comprised an entrance hall, two parlours, a 'capital drawing room with two windows', a dairy, larder, washhouse and kitchen. Two staircases led to six bedrooms on the first floor, and on the upper floor were six attics. The house also had five cellars.

By then Hugh was also farming two other farms on the estate, over 700 acres in total, employing some 13 labourers and five boys, but by 1891 he and his wife had moved to Manor House, Eakley Lanes. It's not clear who occupied the Horton Inn farmhouse that year, but by 1897 it was home to Henry Greening and his family. He didn't take on the tenancy of the farm itself, and soon afterwards the house became known as Horton Grange.
