

On top of the wasted council tax money spent on the signs and paraphernalia at the side of the road to further distract drivers, we get this group pointing their gun at us.

The Lands Pathway

Following continued pressure from the parish council WNC Highways have now agreed that the footpath has deteriorated further and they will foot the bill for resurfacing it. Work should be undertaken within the next 4-6 weeks. In the meantime the Parish Council is having the whole area cut back and sided out so that we achieve the maximum width re-surfacing that we can. The Parish Council is delighted that the cost of £11,847.04 will be covered by WNC Highways and would like to thank residents for helping achieve this outcome by reporting on Street Doctor.



The Parish Council met on 11th June when eight councillors were present together four members of the public, Police Sergeant Lorna Clarke, Unitary Councillor Fiona Cole and the Parish Clerk.

D-Day 80 Beacon Lighting Event

Thursday 6th June 2024

Police

Police Sargent Lorna Clarke was present at the parish council meeting. She confirmed that the perpetrators of the vandalism to the caravan at the Roman Dig have been dealt with appropriately. (See also separate item in the Mag').

Annual Parish Meeting

23rd May 2024

Thank you to all community groups and stakeholders who took part in the meeting and to all residents who attended. The minutes of the meeting are published elsewhere in this edition of the Mag'.

Highways/Road Safety

Following a road traffic accident on the Preston Deanery Crossroads on 31st May involving three vehicles the Parish Clerk immediately contacted West Northants to complain about the lack of visibility due to the overgrown and unmown grass, they immediately attended site to cut the grass back. The Parish Council will now follow this up with a formal complaint.

Speed Data from the Parish Council Speed Indicator Devices has been downloaded and shows that 85% of drivers drive at 34mph into Horton on Brafield Road and 33mph into new Hackleton. The Police and WNC Highways operate a tolerance in a 30mph limit of 85% at 35mph.

Wildlife, Biodiversity & Environment

A report on the latest Hackleton WEB meeting can be found as a separate item in the Mag'. The Parish Council has amended and updated its Wildlife, Biodiversity & Environment policy which can be found on our website https://www.hackletonparishcouncil. gov.uk.

Brent Klegaris welcomed everyone to the event and introduced **Mick Lee** as the compere for the evening.

Mick began with a very personal and poignant wartime story that highlighted the type of enemy the allied forces faced during the liberation of mainland Europe. Three more moving and emotional first-hand recollections expertly read by members of **Group Eight** gave real insight into the conditions on the D-Day beaches on 6 June 1944.

Reverend Mark Hurley continued with more thought-provoking stories from that fateful day and then led us in prayers of remembrance.

6 June 2024 Piddington Beacon

Fine weather and exemplary organisation combined to ensure a very fitting event to commemorate and remember the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings of 1944. Our beacon lighting ceremony was part of the National Commemoration and it was another occasion of which our parish can be proud. The brilliantly organised event was presented to a very large audience who were all keen to show their respect for the historic events which still shape our lives exactly 80 years later.







The **Internationl Tribute** was imaginatively presented and impeccably recited by representatives of the community including: Hackleton and District WI, Firework Team, Hackleton Village Hall, Hackleton CEVA Primary School, Salcey Lodge, Hackleton Parish Council, 1st Hackleton Scouts.



Not publicised before but perfectly in-keeping with the event, **Sergeant Lance Keightley** marched his squad of **army cadets** on to the site with, as you would expect, military precision. Brilliant. Following a respectful two-minute

silence, Sergeant Keightley lit the beacon which blazed its message into darkening night sky.

The mood was lifted with some inspirational singing by local choir **Just Sing!** and then they led the audience in a community sing-song of old wartime favourites.

The successful evening was wrapped up with the singing of the National Anthem.

PS. It was great to see many copies of the Mag's pull-out programme being used on the night.




Thank You

Annual Parish Meeting

23rd May 2024

The Vice-Chairman of the Parish Council **Pam Heap** welcomed 71 residents and/or stakeholders to the meeting and then outlined the year's major achievements.

Hackleton Parish Council – Chairman's Report 2023-24

We delivered our second big project in two years – the new playground. We now have over 50 fun activities for children 0 -12 years old supporting their developmental milestones whilst providing an amazing play facility.

The pedestrian gate into the recreation ground has also been replaced with a new metal gate. We have requested WNC improve the safety of the ditch to the right of the pedestrian gate and once this is done the perimeter fencing in that area will be replaced.

Support for the Environment

Our Wildlife, Biodiversity and Environment Working Party has become a more independent forum now known as Hackleton WEB. The public meetings have been well supported and this support is growing.

The purpose of the group is to consider ways in which the community can take action to combat climate change through the 3 Rs – Re-use, Reduce & Recycle – and to encourage awareness in others. There have been several environment-related articles in the Parish Mag, and the Parish Council distributed wild flower seed packets to every household in the Parish.

The latest initiative of Hackleton WEB is to reduce plastic waste and car use by having the **Green Machine** – a company that brings zero waste shopping to your doorstep. The group is also looking at setting up a **Repair Café** where small items can be repaired by suitably skilled volunteers.

Other environmental works undertaken by the parish council include additional trees being planted in

the cemetery and the hedging infilled in front of the Recreation Ground.

We have supported the excellent work undertaken by both the Longland Meadow Volunteer Group and the Churchyard Volunteer Group. This has included purchasing a birdbath, hedgehog house, water butt and small pond for the churchyard and additional plants for the Meadow.

Additional dog waste bins have been installed around the parish.

An independent tree survey was commissioned of all trees on parish council land and trees which could impact parish council assets. Tree and hedge works have been undertaken to improve safety, visibility and the general appearance of our locality

The bank along the Cemetery Extension has been grass seeded and visually improved.

We would like to thank our local Wombles for all of their hard work litter picking around the Parish.

Health & Wellbeing

We set up a **Health & Wellbeing** working party to explore the health and wellbeing needs of the parish. Many meetings with WNC and stakeholders have taken place and in December we were awarded a grant to set up a Good Neighbour Scheme. We sent questionnaires to every household asking about what groups, facilities people attended or used in the parish and what they would like to see happen going forward. Following this a health and wellbeing launch took place in February, attended by over 35 residents.

In conjunction with Public Health Northamptonshire and WNC we have provided financial support to set



up the **Otago** exercise classes delivered by our local fitness experts, Team Thomas. This program aims to prevent falls by improving balance, co-ordination and confidence. The classes are proving to be very popular.

The **Good Neighbour Scheme** is in its first stages of coming together and the working party would like to set up a Dementia group as well as a craft group and a walking football group. The working party hopes to attract more volunteers for its schemes.

Supporting local groups

Grant funding has been provided to local organisations including the Football Club, the Pre-School, the WI, and the Village Hall

We continue to provide financial support to the ABILITY Community Transport Scheme.

Highways

We continue to report all highway and footpath issues to West Northants including potholes, blocked drains, unsafe surfacing etc. We urge you all to report issues on **Northampton Street Doctor**.

We have had site meetings regarding blocked drains and gullies, potholes and footpaths and continue to put pressure on Highways for remedial works.

We are in regular contact with the local Police team and the mobile speed camera is often seen in the parish.

We have purchased a second portable Speed Indicator Device to encourage drivers to slow down.

WNC Highways have installed a post on Brafield Road from which they have been capturing speed data. Will we now use post and another post installed in New Hackleton as additional locations for our Speed Indicator Devices.

Various speed reduction signage has been purchased including our cut out Police Officers and Crossing Patrol figures which are located near to the school

We are very grateful to our Community Speedwatch team of volunteers who were active during the year and will also be on patrol this year.

Street Lighting

All street lights have had their electrical testing certificates renewed and all columns have been structurally tested and repaired where necessary.

Parish Council News

I would like to thank all councillors for their continued hard work and dedication to our parish. They all volunteer their time for free.

We are very lucky to have **Alison Benson** as our Clerk, Alison works extremely hard to ensure the Council is run legally and efficiently and she oversees all parish council decisions and projects. Alison is the first port of call for residents and holds regular monthly surgeries in the Coffee Shop.

Claire Sparkes our very conscientious litter picker has additional duties in Piddington Cemetery and on the Recreation Ground – thank you Claire.

Steve Taylor our Groundsman is doing a good job looking after the Parish despite the weather being against him for most of the winter and early spring.

Our **Planning Committee** works diligently responding to planning consultations issued by West Northants Planning Department.

All Parish Councillors and the Parish Clerk have attended many meetings, conferences and training events over the last 12-months.



Freedom of the Parish

The Freedom of the Parish represents the highest honour that the Parish Council can bestow and is only awarded in recognition of exceptional service to the Parish.

Sheila Nunn is the second person to be granted the Freedom of Hackleton Parish in recognition of her exceptional service to our community. Back in the 1960's, Sheila set up the local pre-school which is still going strong today and has devoted decades of her life to our local children. Sheila is a huge champion of our community.



Future projects

We are currently negotiating with Grand Union Housing Group to take over the open green spaces in front of The Crescent and at the top and bottom of Carey Road. This will ensure that the open spaces are better maintained and cared for.

We await further proposals from our working parties to enable us to further their initiatives including wildlife & biodiversity, health & wellbeing and highways & road safety.

Guest Speakers



Councillor Phil Larratt West Northants Council cabinet member for Highways and Transport

Councillor Larratt explained that WNC has statutory duties which include keeping the highways safe but he pointed out that WNC does not have the money to make all the repairs to our roads that are required.

The local highway network needs an investment of £291m to undertake all repairs. There are currently 8,477 highway cases on report which need attention of which 971 are located within Hackleton Parish. The 971 cases will cost £2.24m to repair and the total West Northants Highways budget is £24m.

Cllr Larratt quoted an example of the difficulties faced:

The Queen Eleanor junction should have been upgraded two years ago before the first property on the Hardingstone Sustainable Urban Extension was occupied. WNC Highways and National Highways have struggled to agree on this upgrade and it now appears that the money originally allocated is insufficient for this project. It is hoped that the scheme will be finalised this year and will result in wider lanes, more running lanes and changes to the traffic light sequencing. The WNC Electric Vehicle Charging Strategy is currently out for consultation.


Central Government has delegated powers to allow local councils to enforce moving traffic offences. Five sites in and around Northampton have had cameras installed for this purpose.

The Local Transport Plan is being developed and should be out for consultation later this year.

Cllr Larratt then took questions from the floor

Local resident, Reg Ward, took full advantage of meeting by voicing his concerns about the dreadful state of the road surface of Sansome Close in Hackleton. Reg was keen to know why Sansome Close has never been resurfaced when adjacent Lyne Walk has been – Sansome Close is considerably older than Lyne Walk. Various Council 'promises' made over the last 19 years have never been fulfilled. Reg presented Councillor Larratt with a sheaf of documents accumulated over the years. Councillor Larratt took the information onboard and promised to speak with his Assistant Director regarding the issue.

Safety concerns were raised about when turning right out of Waitrose onto the B526 – Councillor Larratt agreed to take the comments on board.



In answer to residents' queries regarding Councillor Larratt's example of the Queen Eleanor roundabout improvement scheme, Mr Larratt tried to explain why the improvements are some two years overdue and why the developer of the Hardingstone properties hasn't been sanctioned in some way.

Could a park and ride service be provided for the hospital – community transport schemes are being looked at and a bus service improvement plan to support rural areas raised an ironic chuckle from the floor.

Sylvia Newnham Wellidogs



Wellidog is a small local charity based at Grendon Lakes. It was set up 30 years ago with two rented kennels and it now has fifteen. It employs one full time member of staff and one part timer. It is a registered charity with a board of trustees. If someone agrees to take on a dog, they have to agree not to pass it on if you can't keep the dog, it must go back to Wellidog. This enables the charity to keep track of all dogs. Nine dogs have been successfully placed within Hackleton Parish. If anybody would like to volunteer to walk the dogs please get in contact. Many residents make donations from the parish and this is very much appreciated – thank you.

Judeth Willoughby Charity



DANGER! Giant Hogweed found in local garden



A member of the WI's Greenfingers group recently found a large plant in her garden. She hadn't placed it there herself, and it was identified as Giant Hogweed. The seed may have been dropped by a bird, bit we have no idea where the original plant is. And why worry, it's just a plant that looks like very large cow parsley – pretty.

But this is not just a pretty flower, it has some very nasty stuff in its sap. The sap can cause photosensitivity, meaning that the skin becomes sensitive to sunlight and contact may result in blisters, pigmentation and long lasting scars. If the sap comes in contact with eyes it has been known to cause temporary or permanent blindness.

So how to identify it, as it is very similar to its smaller cousin, Hogweed.

Well, Giant Hogweed is huge, it can grow up to three and a half metres high. It has thick, bristly stems which are often blotched with purple. It usually flowers in June/July. The flowers are white, in flat-topped clusters like cow parsley, and these flowers point upwards. The flower head clusters can grow up to 60cm wide. It is biennial, and sometimes perennial, so in the first year will just be a rosette of jagged lobed leaves, with the flower spike emerging the next year.

The Royal Horticultural Society says there is no statutory obligation for landowners to eliminate this plant, but it is an offence to cause it to grow in the wild in England and Wales. It is also subject to the Anti-Social Behaviour Orders, so that occupiers of land where this grows can be asked to remove it or face penalties.

When controlling it you must always wear gloves, cover your arms and legs, and ideally wear a face-mask and



goggles when working near it. Remember that the cut plant debris, contaminated clothing and tools are also potentially dangerous.

The best time to remove it is before it flowers, and certainly before it sets seed.

It is a controlled waste so if removed from your garden must be disposed of in licensed landfill sites with the right documentation. To avoid this dispose of any of the plant material by burning or composting (but make sure the compost process gets to a sufficient heat to get rid of all dangers).

Tales from the Villages

Horton Grange

Maureen Williams concludes this two-part story detailing the history of one of the parish's local landmarks

When we left Horton Inn farmhouse last month, it was 1897. Henry Greening and his wife Emily were the new tenants, and the house soon became known as Horton Grange. The couple had two young daughters and employed a cook, a housemaid, and a governess.

Born in Birmingham in 1866, Henry Richard Greening attended King Edwards, a public school in Edgbaston, and then joined his father's insurance company. He married Emily Harrison in 1889 and they moved to Hardingstone in about 1892 before settling in Horton. Henry worked as an insurance broker in Sheep Street, Northampton, and later became branch manager of the Law Accident Insurance Society Ltd, a position he held for 34 years until his retirement in 1932. He was one of the founders of the Northampton Insurance Institute, twice serving as its president.

Henry took an active part in local life, representing the parish on the Hardingstone Rural District Council for over 30 years, and he was vice-chairman of the Hardingstone Board of Guardians. He also served as a churchwarden at Horton for 32 years.

He hunted with the Grafton and the Oakley hunts, and was a keen cyclist, winning many races on his penny-farthing. He was also a member of the Northamptonshire Automobile Club, again winning many events, including a hill climbing competition in 1907 in his 24hp Minerva car.

In October 1935, the Grange, still part of the Horton Estate, was put up for sale following the death of the owner, Harold Winterbottom. It had undergone a number of improvements since the sale in 1887. It now boasted a cloakroom off the entrance hall with a toilet and washbasin, one of the parlours was now the



dining room and the other had become a billiard room. The kitchen was fitted with an Eagle Range, a Beeston domestic boiler, and butler's pantry, and there were also two larders, a dairy and a scullery. On the first floor there were now seven bed and dressing rooms, two bathrooms, day and night nurseries, a heated linen cupboard and a housemaid's pantry, and there were five attic bedrooms and a boxroom on the upper floor.

The house failed to find a buyer, and a month later an advert for the sale of the contents of the house appeared in the newspapers, on 'instructions from H R Greening Esq, who is leaving.' He and Emily moved to Dorset.

The Grange was advertised for sale again in 1937 and was eventually purchased a year later by Major Edmund Allday. Edmund Herbert Allday was born in Solihull in 1893, the son of the director of an engineering company. In 1911, Edmund was working as an engineer for his father and living with his parents and four older sisters in Silhill House, a 24-roomed house on Station Road*. Solihull. Four servants lived in.

At the start of the First World War, Edmund enlisted as a 2nd lieutenant in the Motor Transport Company of the Army Service Corps. By 1918 he was a captain, and he was promoted to major in 1920. In 1918 he married Beatrice Blackburn. The couple probably met through her brother, Vivian Gaskell Blackburn, who was offering passenger flights in his biplane at a flying event that Edmund organised in Solihull in May 1913. Vivian went on to have a distinguished career as a squadron commander in the Royal Naval Air Service during the First World War.

After the war, Edmund set up Allday's Motors in Jermyn Street London, repairing, and buying and selling motor vehicles. He ran into financial difficulties in 1924 but was trading again in 1930 when he was accused of fraud. It seems that this was probably poor business management rather than criminal activity.

Beatrice died in Kensington on 3rd January 1932, and just six months later he married Sarah Eugenie Comby (née Boullerne) in Chelsea, which seems somewhat insensitive, unless of course the marriage had already foundered. Edmund's new wife was French and had a ten-year-old son, John Claude, from her first marriage.

When the 1939 Register was taken at the start of the Second World War, the Grange was occupied by Sarah, John Claude, and their housemaid, plus two married ladies and four children, who were presumably some of the evacuees who had arrived in the villages at the beginning of September. Edmund had been appointed Regional Area Officer for the North Midlands for the Ministry of Supply and was staying at an hotel in Nottingham. His role was to liaise between the Ministry and the firms fulfilling government contracts.

At some point either before or after the war, he set up Horton Motor Works, repairing and dealing in motor vehicles, including buses and lorries. His garages and workshops stood on the land now occupied by Regent Way (named after the Regent petrol station that later stood on the site). However, Edmund again ran into

financial difficulties; in 1954 a notice in the newspapers announced an auction of antique and modern furniture and effects at Horton Grange 'on orders of the receiver.' When he died in 1958, he was living at Archer Farm, Gayton, but he is buried at Horton.

Five years later in 1963, Horton Grange was purchased by chef David Partridge and his wife Mary, and it became the original award-winning French Partridge restaurant.

*Talk about coincidences!

I lived in Station Road, Solihull in the 1960s, although Silhill House had disappeared by that time. Not only that, but before they moved to Northamptonshire, Henry and Emily Greening lived in Sandford Road in Moseley, Birmingham, which is off Kingswood Road where my husband Bob grew up, and like Henry Greening, Bob attended King Edwards, albeit some 80 years later.

This position, however, makes the flora and fauna more interesting and diverse. Since the beginning the project various additions have been made to the churchyard such as insect hotels, log piles and a small pond to name a few. The church wildlife group is going to be evaluated for the Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire and Northamptonshire Wildlife Trust for their silver award. Walking through the churchyard always brings to my mind the hymn most of us know from our school days, 'All things bright and beautiful' and in particular these two verses:



Repairs at Piddington Church

More to the process than meets the eye



I had not appreciated that the production of carved stonework is such a complicated process. Briefly, huge blocks of stone are purchased from a quarry and taken to a workshop where all the rough edges are removed. The stone is then sawn into smaller blocks more suited to hand working by computer controlled machinery to minimise wastage and finally delivered to our stonemason who works the stone to produce the required shapes.

Work at Piddington is further complicated by the need for two different types of stone from different quarries to replicate the existing colours.

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
