

Parish Council Notes

12 December 2023 / 9 January 2024

Alison Benson Clerk to the Council

Since the last Parish Mag' the Parish Council met on the 12th December 2023 when ten councillors were present together with the Parish Clerk and on 9th January when nine councillors were present together with Unitary Councillor Fiona Cole, one member of the public and the Parish Clerk.

Recreation Ground

We continue to liaise with Hags regarding the outstanding snagging issues with the new play equipment.

The pedestrian gate into the Recreation Ground from Main Road is to be moved back in line with the footpath and replaced with a metal gate, post and clapping post. The grass area inside the gate will be re-seeded in the Spring. Additional hedge plants will be planted to fill in a few gaps.

Our Groundsman has repaired the fence which was broken by people climbing over it.

Following pressure from the Parish council WNC has confirmed that it will draft a scheme to install gullies in the ditch at the front of the Recreation Ground so that the ditch can be closed over. WNC envisage that this will be undertaken in the 2024/25 financial year.

Dog fouling is becoming a big issue and the Parish Council will undertake a campaign requesting residents pick-up after their dogs at all times. If things don't improve then the Parish Council may have no option but to ban dogs. Dogs must also be kept on a lead around the play equipment at all times.

Longland Meadow

Council has decided not to proceed with a new water connection on the Meadow due to the costs involved.

Health and Wellbeing

A guestionnaire about health and wellbeing facilities within the parish will be distributed with the February edition of the Parish Mag' it will also be uploaded to the parish council website and Facebook pages. A Get Up and Go! Exercise program is to be set-up within the parish. The Parish Council will fund one trial session per resident and the first 8-weeks rent. The Get Up & Go classes utilise OTAGO exercises which are evidence based in the prevention of falls, which is proven to:

- Reduce falls
- Reduce injury due to falls
- Improve balance & strength
- Improve ability to complete everyday tasks
- Increase stamina
- Improve mood
- Improve confidence and independence

Community Governance Review

The proposed changes to the Hackleton Parish Boundary have now been consulted on and the Parish council has made the following response to the consultation:

Hackleton Parish Council supports the recommendation to move Hackleton Urban Ward into Wootton Parish. It would also like to future-proof these changes by including the development land as shown outlined red on the map at https://www. hackletonparishcouncil.gov.uk/uploads/ wootton-location-plan-487806-01-red-line. pdf?v=1702569678 in the boundary change. This will mean that residents in new properties on the development land do not end up in the same situation as residents on St George's Fields and our part of Wootton where they are within Hackleton Parish but identify with and use all amenities at Wootton which they can reach on foot.

We support this boundary move on the understanding that the remaining Hackleton Ward (Hackleton Parish) be increased to eleven councillors (we currently have

three councillors living in Hackleton, three in Horton and five in Piddington) so to ensure that the views of all residents in all areas of the rural parish are represented and to allow us to continue to reflect local identities and facilitate effective and convenient local government. This will protect our ability to support our residents, enable continuation and further expansion of services and take on any potential additional services that are devolved to the parishes in the future from West Northants Council.

The Parish Council is consulted by the Planning Department and below are the most recent responses.

Horton Lodge Farm, Brafield Road, Horton NN7 2BA

2023/7578/FULL — The construction of a single storey timber clad contemporary garden building for use as a commercial office. RESOLVED: To make the following comment: We would like to see a tree planting scheme to soften the landscape and mitigate the loss of green space.

Bridleway, 2 Old End, Piddington NN7 2DF 2023/7736/FULL - Single storey rear extension &

porch/garage roof to be replaced with new flat roof. RESOLVED: No objection

Horton Lodge, Ravenstone Lane, Horton NN7 2BH

2023/7202/FULL - Proposed extensions to pool complex. RESOLVED: No objection

Land south of Horton Road, Hackleton NN7 2AW

2023/7948/FULL — Erection of a Boundary Fencing. RESOLVED: To strongly object to this application and to request it is called in to planning committee. The land is protected by a confirmed Article 4 Direction. The purpose of the Article 4 Direction was to protect this area of open countryside from subdivision. Such subdivision would detrimentally affect the open rural character and appearance of the countryside through the incongruous and unjustified subdivision of the land and the consequent erection of boundary treatments as now submitted. No documentation is submitted with the application to explain the reason for the fencing in agricultural terms. The permitted use of this land is agricultural only. The proposed fence is on the line marked 1 on the submitted plan. This proposal would therefore be a subdivision of an existing field which contravenes the Article 4 Direction as noted above. HPC does not understand the relevance of the area marked in blue on the plan as that would normally refer to other land within the control of the applicant and we are concerned to note that the red line is titled development land. This is all agricultural land and certainly not development land. Also, please note that the right of way as marked on the plan does not exist and is marked on historical ridge and furrow land. There also appear to be a number of lines on the plan which do not exist and are not marked on the ground. Although not part of this application we again consider that the access to the land is not suitable for multiple occupants and we refer you to the refusal for application WNC/2022/0836/FUL.

2023/8046/S73 — Demolition of existing bungalow. Proposed 2 no. 4-bedroom dwellings with integral garaging, external parking and amenity spaces. RESOLVED: No objection

Owen Thomas' experience in Strictly Northampton was a journey from the great outdoors to centre stage



I am a simple soul at heart. When I read a book, I like to know whom I'm supposed to be rooting for. Which is why I love reading fantasy so much.



My first contact with a proper, grown-up fantasy came at the age of 13, when I read J.R.R. Tolkien's *The Lord of the Rings* for the first time. I was on a long coach trip to Germany with the school and, being entirely unable to sleep in a moving vehicle, just read and read and read. This was like nothing I had ever encountered before — I had never been so completely involved in a story. I became totally absorbed in the world of Middle-Earth and felt a shock as keen as pain when I reached the last sentence: "'Well, I'm back', he said."

Since then I must have read *The Lord of the Rings* well over a hundred times, and always there is something new to notice, something enchanting to savour. I had never come across an author who realised his fictional world so completely — history, geography, different peoples and their customs, mythology — it is all there.

So perhaps it was inevitable that I would one day want to try my hand at writing a fantasy of my own. And I knew that the "worldbuilding" would be enormous fun, so I spent many hours working out all the details of my fantasy world, the Commonweal of Veylindré. I even drew a detailed map, of which I am ridiculously proud.

I knew from reading books by many authors of fantasy that the task of bringing such a complicated world to life would be easier if I could hang the events of the plot onto some kind of underlying structure. In the case of *The Stones of Veylindré*, I decided to use the twelve-point structure of the Hero's (or in this case, the

Heroine's) Journey, which is used by many fantasy writers. But I also wanted to explore how the beliefs we hold and the choices we make have can have a really significant impact on our lives.

I also knew that I wanted my main character to be from our world, so I made her a seventeen-

year old girl from England in the 1660s, Abigail. She leaves England with a small group of pilgrims and during a terrific storm in the Atlantic, the pilgrims are translated to the Commonweal of Veylindré. When the rest are murdered by pirates, Abigail vows to make a new life for herself in this strange world, with her boyfriend, Jacob. Some Dagâran people befriend them, and Abigail and Jacob soon realise that Veylindré is quite different to the England they left behind. All Veylindréans worship the Six, and are able to do magic by accessing the mysterious Way through their Goldstones. But they have an enemy, the Prophet of the One, who rules in Talamdor. The choices Abigail and Jacob make in response to the changes they experience have huge consequences for both their lives . . . If you want to know any more, you'll have to buy the book!

It took more than three years to write the first draft of *The Stones of Veylindré*, and 18 months more to revise it, before I sent it out to beta readers. More revision followed, and it was not until March 2022, that I began to approach publishers. I was delighted when Jon Davies of Scimitar Edge, a small, independent press, published the first volume, *The Goldstones and the Way* in mid-November 2023 and it is now available through Amazon. The second and third volumes, *The Prophet and the Wayzenmoot* and *The Bloodstone of Talamu*, will be published in 2024.





Welcomed to Hackleton Parish at a Licensing Service in Piddington Church



Greetings one and all

I am delighted to join you all in Hackleton Parish. I thought that a brief introduction may be in order.

I was born and brought up in Bristol, on the large council estates on the southside. I was not from a church or religious family — quite the opposite. A card-carrying atheist, until one night when God's presence became very real and close. In the course of time, I will explain and share more with you.

I studied for my first degree at Trinity Bristol, then moved to Salisbury and worked toward a further degree. This time though I was studying to become a minister in the Church of England. Once completed, I went to Lincoln Diocese to be a curate (like an apprenticeship — without Lord Sugar!!).

I served in three posts in Lincoln, whilst also being a hospital chaplain, prison visiting, drug centres, victim

support and many other places. I was even asked to join the Royal Army Chaplains Dept, after spending several weeks with them, as well as time at RAF Scampton and even flew with them.

I have also served in Oxford, Rochester and Bath and Wells before coming to Hackleton.

In my personal life I have varied interests, most revolving around music, both playing and production. I am also interested in military history, especially wargaming.

I will leave it there for now and hopefully have chance to share with you more at a later date.

The Piddington Bakehouse

The history of the old bakehouse in Chapel End, Piddington can be traced back with a fair degree of certainty to 1854, when the baker was Joseph Keightley. Joseph and his wife Ruth had one daughter, Elizabeth, born in 1854. She married John Cave in 1874 and he joined his father-in-law in the business, but when he died in 1884 aged just 34, Joseph employed journeyman baker Arthur Brown to assist him.

By 1901 Arthur had taken over the business and when in 1911, at the age of 44, he married Mary Elizabeth Britten of Moulton, she became an assistant in the bakery. Bread baked in the Piddington bakehouse used to be delivered to all the surrounding villages, initially by horse and cart and later by van.

Mary died in 1933, and when the 1939 Register was taken, Arthur, now in his seventies, was still living in the house, but the head of the household was master baker Arthur Mawby.

Arthur Thomas Mawby was born in The Jetty, Hackleton in 1905, and by the age of 16 was working for Arthur

Brown as a baker's assistant. He married Alice Jones, daughter of head forester Tom Jones of Piddington Lodge in 1933 and they went on to have two children, Arthur and Hazel. Alice used to manage the shop, which also sold home-made cakes and general groceries. A loaf of bread cost 4½d and 3lbs of flour was about 9d. The bakehouse closed in the 1950s, but the shop remained open for several more years.

There was also a smaller bakery on Forest Road, Piddington, but that's another story . . .


STOP PRESS

The Group Eight cast from the 2023 pantomime production of Mother Goose.


