The Parish council met on 12th March when nine councillors were present together one member of the public and the Parish Clerk

Highways/Road Safety

WNC Highways have conducted a speed data capture on Lyne Walk which recorded the 85th percentile (speed of 85% of drivers) as 17-19mph with a top speed recorded during the capture period of 32 mph.

The Football Club has been asked to speak to its away supporters requesting that they park more considerately on match days.

Community Speed Watch signage and "Drive Like Your Kids Play Here" signs are to be purchased for use around the parish.

Recreation Ground

We continue to liaise with Hags regarding the outstanding snagging issues with the new play equipment.

Dog fouling is becoming a big issue and the Parish Council will undertake a campaign requesting residents pick-up after their dogs at all times. If things don't improve then the Parish Council may have no option but to ban dogs. Dogs must also be kept on a lead around the play equipment at all times.

Maintenance and safety inspections have been received for all equipment and issues raised actioned.



Wildlife, Biodiversity and Environment

Be patient and persevere

Practical wild flowering advice

There is something magical about a packet of seeds. They contain a promise, a nod towards warmer weather and buzzing bees, a small parcel of hope. So I was delighted to receive the wildflower seeds with our last magazine, a really welcome gift.

But having attempted to grow and maintain a wildflower meadow for many years, it was a gift that made me pause and reflect. Because guite honestly (and from years of experience), the promise contained in the packet isn't always realised. And as the gift is such a lovely initiative, which I really want to work, I thought I'd offer some advice.

Prepare your chosen ground

Firstly, read the instructions. So many people think that simply flinging the seeds onto a patch of lawn will result in a profusion of insect friendly flora. But grass is a greedy perennial and will not give ground easily. If you have the space in a sunny flowerbed, earmark a weed-free area and prepare the soil so that there is room for them to germinate, with well tilled earth to stretch their young roots into. You can also just fill a pot with fresh compost and plant your seeds in there. But do make sure in the early stages that the pot does




not sit in a saucer. The seeds will not thrive in boggy conditions, good drainage is vital and a pot saucer to retain moisture won't be needed until high summer. Regardless of whether you are planting into a bed or a pot, cover with a little peat free compost and use a fine sprinkler to water them in.

And then wait

Resist the temptation to over water, even when your seedlings first appear. And sadly, many young wildflower plants are irresistible to rabbits, so you may





need to use a bit of mesh or even a makeshift barrier if you are prone to bunny visitors, particularly in the early stages. But as the plants establish themselves, they become less succulent and appealing and as they grow more robust you should start to get some glorious colour and attract a range of grateful pollinators.

Many wildflowers belong to groups that want to form colonies. You might find that if you leave your pot or flowerbed until the following year, just in the interest of experimentation, only one species returns. This will be the dominant species and it is not always the prettiest (step forward Buckwheat), but this will give you a good idea of what you want to see in the future. This is the true magic of a packet of seeds. The contents can transform the way you see your outdoor space and make you realise that what pleases you can also be of significant value to the insect visitors that we so desperately need to encourage. If we can all do this, across our village communities we will be offering critical support to our local ecological environment. When our actions benefit the natural world we are. ultimately, just benefitting ourselves.





Education before punishment

Community Speedwatch is a preventative educational initiative

Everyone speeds occasionally. It is unavoidable. Most drivers do it unintentionally, others do it habitually. It is the regular offenders who need police attention and intervention. However, anyone caught speeding unintentionally by the police or by a fixed/mobile roadside camera is dealt with in the same way as the habitual offender. This leads to a degree of resentment towards the randomness of the current speed enforcement regime.

A Reasonable Approach

When a vehicle is 'caught' by Community Speedwatch (CSW), the registered keeper of the vehicle is contacted - initially with a letter explaining the potential risks and consequences of their dangerous behaviour. It is hoped that this educational approach will be sufficient to prevent further speeding offences. However, repeat offenders can expect a visit from the police and this may lead to criminal prosecution based on the collated evidence. CSW believe that this focused enforcement approach is a much fairer solution than the current 'one size fits all'.

The scheme allows the local community to record and report drivers speeding in our villages and promotes the message that we take road safety seriously in our Parish.






Maureen Williams continues her Tales from the Villages with the story behind this landmark building.

Head south from the crossroads on the Newport Pagnell Road towards Preston Deanery, cross the brook on the Grade II listed bridge built in 1715, and on your right you will find the entrance gates to Preston Deanery Hall, which nestles in beautiful landscaped gardens between the brook and the church. Now the home of Sam and Karen Mackaness, this impressive looking house was in fact the annexe housing the domestic quarters of the original Hall pictured here, which was demolished in 1934.

The oldest part of the Hall dated back to Tudor times when it was owned by Sir Robert Hertwell, and it was purchased in 1620 by Sir Clement Edmondes. Sir Clement was secretary of the French language to Queen Elizabeth I, and later became one of the four clerks to the privy council in the reign of James I. Educated at Oxford, he was remembered as "a learned person, was generally skill'd in all arts and sciences,

and famous as well for military, as for political affairs, and therefore esteemed by all as an ornament to his degree and profession". He is buried in Preston Deanery Church. One of his direct descendants, Jonathan Starck, contributes to the upkeep of the church and was very helpful to me when I was researching the history of the Hall.

The Tudor building was guite sizeable, having 15 hearths, but much of it was demolished and rebuilt in the first guarter of the 18th century by Sir Richard Newman, who inherited the estate in 1701. Sir Richard served as High Sheriff of Northamptonshire in 1706-07.

The Hall remained in the hands of the Newman family until it was sold by Charles Toll Newman to Langham Christie, a relative by marriage, in 1815. Langham's mother was the granddaughter of Sir John Langham, 4th Bt of Cottesbrooke. In the 1840s, Langham



employed the architect Samuel Sanders Teulon to extend and redesign the Hall. Much of his work was for the Anglican Church, but Teulon also designed country houses, cottages, and schools for wealthy landowners, including Queen Victoria, and was also responsible for the Buxton Memorial Fountain in the Victoria Tower Gardens next to the Houses of Parliament, and the entire village of Thorney in Cambridgeshire. His greatgreat-great-nephew, Alan Teulon, lives in Northampton and shared with me some of his ancestor's designs for Preston Deanery Hall. Two drawings in the Record Office by amateur artist George Clarke show the Hall before and after Teulon's alterations. It was said that people either loved or hated Teulon's Gothic Revival style designs, and I, for one, prefer the 'before' drawing!

In the 1850s Langham Christie inherited the Glyndebourne Estate in Sussex and it became the home of his son William. It was William's grandson John Christie who, having married the opera singer Audrey Mildmay, built the original theatre at Glyndebourne in 1934 and founded the Glyndebourne Festival.

William Christie inherited the Preston Deanery Estate on his mother's death, and sold it in 1871 to Edward Singleton, a member of the Irish landed gentry. However, before he and his family could take up residence, a fire broke out during renovation work, destroying the roof, much of the upper floor, and the staircase. Edward rebuilt that part of the Hall, taking the opportunity to add another storey, and he was also responsible for the addition of the rather incongruous tower.

Edward and his wife were non-conformists, and he is credited with the founding of an evangelical mission movement in Northampton and the building of the

Mission Hall in Abington Square. The building is still there, but now houses the Urban Tiger, a lap-dancing club. I don't think Edward would have approved!

The next owner was Northampton shoe manufacturer Albert Marlow, who purchased the estate in 1908. He too made alterations to the house, adding a billiard room, and carrying out a complete renovation of the annexe housing the domestic guarters. A staunch Liberal, Albert was Mayor of Northampton in 1904-05, and entertained the prime minister's wife, Margaret Lloyd George to lunch at the Hall during her visit to Northampton in 1921. He died a year later, and his widow eventually sold the estate to George Henry Drummond of Pitsford Hall.

Drummond was looking for a property to convert to a health clinic, based on health spas in France and Germany. It opened in 1927, the first of its kind in the country, and was very successful, attracting some illustrious clients, including Lady Clementine Churchill and the artist, Augustus John. So successful was it that four years later it moved to larger premises and the Preston Deanery Estate was put up for auction.

The Hall itself failed to find a buyer, and in 1934 it was demolished, all but the annexe, the current Preston Deanery Hall.

You can find much more information about the Hall. its owners and occupiers, and the wider estate, plus many photos, portraits, and maps, in my book 'Preston Deanery Hall: the story of a house through time,' now available at the reduced price of £12. All profits from the sale of the book go to Hackleton Village Hall.

Churchyard Wildlife Group progress

When faced with a global biodiversity crisis (the UK is particularly impoverished) it can feel like there's nothing we can do - but we can always act locally. If enough of us make a small change we can make a difference.

This year we're looking forward to re-establishing our churchyard wildflower patch, and continue to work on our churchyard management plan. Log piles for beetles and other insects are growing, which also attract birds and hedgehogs. A mini-pond has been established, visited by local frogs, and our adopted graves are starting to bloom again. There are still some graves available for adoption, and we are looking for more plants, like teasel and rosemary to improve food sources.

In summer we are expecting a visit from Wildlife BCN, who run the Churchyard Wildlife Award we are aiming for, and then hopefully we can begin to make progress on Horton churchyard too.

Thinking back to our beautiful wildflower patch over last summer, and our unmown border, both much visited by bees, beetles, ladybirds, hoverflies and butterflies, we are reminded that we can help ensure the survival of pollinators, which are also important for fruit and vegetable production. We were able to create a mini-ecosystem and if we create enough of these spaces we have won a small battle, if not the war. A wildflower spot is not only wonderful to look at; it's a celebration of life in all its forms.

Stonework Repairs at Piddington Church – *finally!*

Do you have one of those 'to do' lists where the actions at the bottom never rise to the top? Do you find that as soon as you tick off a few items something happens that must be done immediately and becomes the top job on your list?

At Piddington Church restoring the stonework around the west doorway at the bottom of the spire has been the perennial wallflower for the last 40 years. In that time, we've been busy raising the money for, among other things, replacing roofs, having a WC installed and refurbishing the organ. Now glory be, the west doorway has finally risen to the top of our lists. As you can see on the photographs the stonework is being eroded by the weather and is slowly crumbling away – the carved features are becoming increasingly indistinct.


Our first task was to try to find old photographs or artwork showing the doorway's original construction. What turned up was the discovery of an illustration from a 1936 book in the County Archives at Wootton Hall. Our architect used this to help prepare drawings and a specification for the restoration work to be carried out.

We then had to consult with the Diocesan Advisory Committee who are a panel of architects and conservationists experienced in the care of historic religious buildings. Once approval has been gained notice of the proposals has to be advertised on the notice boards around the church. Provided there are no objections the final step is the issue of a 'Faculty' by the Chancellor of, in our case, Peterborough Diocese. With the paperwork finished restoration work at the church can actually begin.

This whole process has taken nine months and we finally received our Faculty at the end of February. In the meantime, tenders for the work had been sought and a contractor appointed. You will see work starting at the church in mid-April although most of the replacement stones will have been pre-carved in a workshop.







I am in awe of the members of the WEB Group as they are dedicated and determined to get involved, take positive action and get things done - no ostrichs here!



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
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
