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### In Response to "Concerned of Piddington"

Thank you for your continued interest in the community's road safety initiatives. Speeding is an issue that affects all of us, and it's important that we approach it with a clear understanding of the data and its implications.

Firstly, it's worth clarifying the concept of percentages in the context of speeding data. While the percentage of speeding drivers may appear low, it still represents real people driving at unsafe speeds through our community. Even if only a small percentage of drivers exceed the limit, on a busy road, this still translates to a significant number of vehicles speeding—vehicles that could endanger pedestrians, cyclists, and other drivers. By focusing only on percentages, we risk underestimating the actual number of speeding incidents that pose a genuine safety risk.

Additionally, the reference to an "average" speed between 38mph and 76mph being 50mph seems to oversimplify the issue. Averaging such a wide range doesn't accurately reflect driver behaviour; it can downplay the seriousness of the higher speeds recorded. Seeing speeds as high as 76mph on a road with a much lower limit is cause for concern, regardless of the average. We should focus on reducing these excessive speeds to ensure everyone's safety.

Regarding the reporting threshold of 35mph, it's crucial to remember that while this threshold helps focus enforcement efforts, any speed over the 30mph limit is technically speeding and should be treated as such. The speed limit is a maximum, not a suggestion, and should be followed from the moment drivers enter the 30mph zone until they leave it. Instances where drivers are still slowing down as they enter or speeding up before they exit are just as much a concern, as they put the safety of others at risk. Responsible driving means adhering to the speed limit fully within the zone.

Finally, the community speed watch initiative is not intended to target individual drivers but rather to encourage overall compliance with speed limits. The data collected informs broader safety measures and helps determine where further enforcement might be necessary. Dismissing this information diminishes its value to the community and undermines efforts to improve road safety.

By presenting the facts clearly, I hope all readers can make informed decisions and understand why the community speed watch team's efforts, and the data behind them, are essential in keeping our parish roads safe for everyone.

### Has common sense has prevailed?

It is good to read in the Parish Council notes for 10th October, that some common sense has prevailed on the question of speed buffer zones to protect our parish from the horrors of the speeding motorist.

I largely agree with the decision by WNC. However I would not agree on imposing a buffer zone on the Brafield Road into Horton, this in my view is unnecessary and would have no or very little deterrent effect. I would also follow the Parish Council's view of opposing the lifting of the 30mph limit into New Hackleton and placing a 40mph zone there instead.

Some of you may say that I am being a little cynical here by saying this, but I feel that the latter decision by WNC may have increased the likelihood of drivers falling into the clutches of the "piggy bank" van, which regularly parks up at the school, as speeds would potentially be higher further into the village and closer to the school.

This may have also been part of the thinking behind the refusal of a zone on the approach to Horton on the Newport Pagnell Road, as the same applies, except speeds would have been potentially lower approaching the regular park up of this money making device opposite The French Partridge, therefore reducing possible revenue.



Parish Council Notes

12th November 2024

Alison Benson Clerk to the Council

The Parish Council met on 12th November when eleven councillors were present together with Unitary Councillor Fiona Cole and the Parish Clerk.

### Highways/Road Safety

At the Parish Council's request WNC Highways have agreed not to increase the speed limit in New Hackleton to 40mph to create a buffer zone between the 60mph open countryside zone and the 30mph village zone.

Temporary road calming signage around the Parish has been reviewed and several signs will be moved or removed so to ensure a tidy and consistent message is given.

### **Street Lighting**

The street light at the bottom of Willoughby Way has been repaired. Several street lights are currently partially obscured by vegetation and the Clerk will contact the appropriate landowners requesting the vegetation be cut back.

### Transfer of land from Grand Union Housing Group to the Parish Council

Grand Union has provided a plan of the area to be transferred and it includes not just the green open spaces but also footpaths, parking areas etc. The Parish Council has only agreed to take ownership of the green open spaces and will not agree to the transfer of any other areas.

#### **Flooding**

Following meets with the Flood Risk Officer from WNC and representatives of the RAIN project the Parish Council continues to press for action to prevent or mitigate any future flooding incidents.

### Community Resilience – Emergency Planning

The Parish Council is considering drawing up a Community Emergency Plan in 2025.

#### **Parish Council Elections 2025**

Following the recent Community Governance Review the Parish will no longer be split into Hackleton Ward and Piddington Ward. There will be vacancies for eleven parish councillors at the May 2025 elections. WNC have now revised the estimate for Hackleton's tax base (the number of properties that council tax is collected from) for 2025/26 as 801.3 which is a reduction from 1261.9. This means that there will need to be a significant reduction in our precept as properties on Wootton Fields and St George's Fields move to Wootton Parish.

The budget for 2025/26 is still being reviewed and finalised.

### Thank you for everything you've done

After more than 22 years serving as a Trustee of Hackleton Village Hall (Dudley Winterbottom Memorial Hall), the last 20 of which in the role of Chairman, Edward Kilpin BEM has decided to stand down at the end of this financial year, 31st December. Edward previously served as Chairman of the Parish Council, for a time at the helm of both Parish and Hall.

In 2004 the Hall was in dire need of more usable space and storage facilities. The back of the building housed myriad asbestos-ridden storage huts belonging to various user groups. The Committee Room could only be accessed through the Main Hall, rendering it unsuitable to be let separately.

In 2007 Edward instigated and led a major fund raising campaign, successfully bidding for multiple grants. The first phase enabled the formation of new toilets and a passage linking the front and back of the main hall. The second phase saw the completion of a separate building in the (newly cleared) grounds behind. This was to be known as the London Marathon Annexe in recognition of the organisation which put up roughly half the money for the building, on the proviso that we matched their donation. Over the next few years many fund-raising events were held and these culminated in the completion of the Annexe in 2011. This selfcontained building consists of three large storage rooms on the ground floor, together with toilets, and a large meeting room on the first floor with kitchen and a small office for Trustee use. The meeting room has been named the Kilpin Suite in recognition of the amazing feat of organising the raising of over £250,000.

Under Edward's guidance the hall has flourished and he has overseen many, many more improvements. The larger of these include the purchase of cinema equipment, air-conditioning and hearing loops in both buildings and refurbishment of the bar and kitchen areas. The latest acquisition of solar panels, fitted to



the Annexe roof should, over time, prove to be a costeffective measure.

Throughout the years Edward has been supported by a loyal band of Trustees, some of whom have served for many years and it is to be hoped that this will continue when a new Chairperson is appointed.

Edward's swan song will be to chair the AGM on 13th February, where he will present his final report and accounts for the year ended 31st December 2024. It is to be hoped that there will be a good turn out of villagers for this event.

On behalf of the Trustees, the many user groups, loyal followers of social events and all the local party givers and event planners, we must thank Edward for his commitment to the Village Hall over his 20 years as Chair of the Trustees.

You will be sorely missed Edward, but please do not forget that we know where you live!

### **Great UK WaterBlitz**

### September 2024 Report

Water is the lifeblood of our planet, nourishing every living thing. An adequate supply of clean, healthy freshwater underpins the very health of our earth and the future of people and wildlife depend upon it.


Despite this, the UK's freshwater ecosystems are in a terrible state. Back in June of this year, 2,630 citizen scientists gathered information on the quality of their local rivers, ponds and lakes. Of the 1,380 sites investigated, 75% showed poor water quality.


One of the report's key findings is particularly depressing for the quality of water in our region:

 Anglian river basin has the worst water quality in the UK: over 80% of surveys showed unacceptable nutrient concentrations.



### **Piddington Churchyard – Success!**

The Churchyard Wildlife Group at St John the Baptist church in Piddington is delighted to have recently received a Silver Award from the Wildlife Trust for its work as part of the Trust's Churchyard Conversation Scheme.

Our group of volunteers came together in 2020 and have been working since then to help and protect wildlife in our churchyard.

With much appreciated help and support from Hackleton Parish Council, the Parochial Church Council and advice from the Wildlife Trust, we've installed two water butts, a hedgehog house, bird and bat boxes, a mini-pond, log piles and a bird bath. We've planted snowdrops, kindly donated by villagers and this Spring planted up a large grave with herbs. We continue to care for our adopted graves (planted with pollinator friendly flowers) and had approval from the Parish Council to leave an unmown strip of grass adjacent to one of the church walls to encourage wild flowers and provide shelter for small mammals and invertebrates. We keep a record of the birds, bees, insects and mammals we spot (lots of little froglets since we installed the pond) as well as wildflowers and grasses (see the full list in the church porch).

Earlier this year we entered the Wildlife Trust's Churchyard Conservation Award Scheme – cheekily skipping the Bronze stage and going straight for Silver. Following our application we were visited by two judges in July with results announced in September.

The Award Forum for Northamptonshire Churches was held on 30 September at St Mary the Virgin church in Stoke Bruerne. As places were limited only three members of our group could attend – Anton Dil, Wenda Dill and myself were the lucky ones. It was good to meet up with other volunteers, hear about their problems and successes and pick up ideas and advice.

Given that there are around 17,500 acres of churchyards in England – that's twice the size of a city like Oxford – churchyards are an important resource for supporting our vulnerable and threated wildlife in the climate and ecological crisis we are facing. The Anglican church itself recognises this. The Bishop of Norwich has called for graveyards to be "places for the living, not just the dead". To date some 90 churches in the county are involved in the Wildlife Trust's conservation initiative and 25 have so far received awards.

Back to the Award Forum – we were hoping for a Silver Award but nothing is certain and we waited with bated breath as the awards were announced. Oh the tension. a bit like the Strictly Results show. So imagine our relief when finally we heard we had qualified for Silver Award (thank goodness we didn't have to do a dance-off).

Onwards and upwards – we've now got Gold in our sights! Working in the churchyard is such a pleasure, whether individually or on one of our regular group work mornings. If you feel like joining us you would be very welcome. Contact Anton at antondil@gmail.com.

### **Hackleton Parish Book Club** is well underway!



The Hackleton Parish Book Club met for the first time in September, in the Library in the Carey Baptist Church, with sixteen people in attendance. Over drinks and Ella's yummy cookies we discussed all manner of bookish things, including how we like to read – the smell and feel of a page vs a Kindle or audiobook. We chatted about our favourite books: To Kill a Mockingbird; Where the Crawdads Sing; Still Life by Sarah Winman and The Five People You Meet In Heaven were among those mentioned. Recommendations were given about sourcing books: local libraries and the Borrow Box app; purchasing from World Of Books which often gives a discount based on the number of books bought, and of course borrowing from friends. Mrs B's Emporium in Bath offers a subscription service for book lovers based on the sorts of books they think customers will enjoy, while The Mysterious Bookcase promises ' A blind date with a book...' . Apps such as Goodreads are the go-to for some seeking recommendations or to rate books they've read too. All can be found online.

The atmosphere was and continues to be enthusiastic, warm and curious, and the shared love of books and a desire to try different genres and seek alternative views and interpretations is evident. The Book Club provides a lovely social community space too, with recognition on how it fits into the wider Good Neighbour activities, and the importance of it being part of the community. The first book chosen for review in November was The Great Alone by Kristen Hannah, which provoked interesting and inciteful discussion. Briefly, the book is a semi-autobiographical novel which follows the Albright family's move to the Alaskan wilderness, and the challenges the move brings them.



Opinions varied about the book, but overall, we felt that it was a good read, and that while at times uncomfortable, it was thought provoking and beautifully descriptive. We recommend it!

### The Rookery, Preston Deanery

Have you ever stood in the cemetery of Piddington Church looking at this view towards Preston Deanery and wondered about the house nestling amongst the trees?



Called The Rookery, this large Victorian house was built in about 1850 by Langham Christie of Preston Deanery Hall. Gentleman farmer George Boulton Lynes was living in the house when the 1861 census was taken, and as he appears to have been residing in Preston Deanery at the time of his marriage to Harriet Spencer of Earl Shilton, Leicestershire five years earlier in 1856, he may have been The Rookery's first tenant.

George's father, Thomas, was Lord of the Manor of Hackleton, and George was brought up in Hackleton House. Describing himself as a 'gentleman landowner' in the 1871 census, George employed 12 men and five boys on the 500-acre Rookery Farm. He also owned some 18 cottages and 'messuages' in Piddington, including the Old Crown and Thistle on Forest Road. George and Harriet's eight children were all born in Preston Deanery, and they employed a cook, housemaid, nurse, under nurse, and groom.

However, like all UK farmers of the time, George was affected by the Great Agricultural Depression which began in 1873, and two years later, perhaps hoping for a better life, he put all his properties in Piddington up for sale by auction and the whole family emigrated to America, sailing from Liverpool aboard the SS Adriatic of the White Star Line, and arriving in New York on 27th September 1875. They settled in Ivy, Albemarle, Virginia where George became a highly respected horse breeder. An article written by him, entitled 'Horse Breeding in Two Hemispheres', appeared in Baily's Magazine of Sports and Pastimes in July 1884.

Grazier William Marriott was The Rookery's next tenant, but the house was unoccupied at the time of the 1881 census.

By 1885 it was home to John Orr-Ewing, his wife Edith, and Helen, his five-year-old daughter by his first wife. The couple had two children while living in Preston

Deanery, Edith Wilhelmina in 1889 and Hugh James in 1891. They employed a married couple as cook and coachman, a housemaid and a Swiss nursemaid. Hugh went on to become a doctor, served in the Royal Army Medical Corps during the First World War, and was awarded the Military Cross. After the war he became a medical missionary in Jerusalem.

The Orr-Ewings left The Rookery shortly after Hugh's birth, and Edward Singleton, who had purchased the Preston Deanery Hall Estate in 1872 and was now 61 years of age, decided to downsize and moved into The Rookery with his wife and unmarried daughter, renting out the Hall. Three years later they moved to Devon, and the next known tenant was a Colonel Edward Bruce. I haven't been able to discover anything about him so far. He was not in residence in 1901, when the house was occupied by a coachman/groom, John Chisholm, and the Colonel had died or moved away by 1906, when the new tenant was Joseph Wakefield Hanson Whitton.

Joseph's father (Joseph Wakefield Whitton) farmed at Potcote, near Towcester and was a Northamptonshire County Councillor. Joseph junior married Annie May Edwards in 1905, so The Rookery was probably the couple's first home. (Incidentally, although Annie was born in London, her father was apparently from Chicago — more research required!) They employed a cook, housemaid and milkmaid, and a groom/gardener and his family lived in the adjacent cottage. Their son (Joseph Wakefield William Whitton!) was born there in 1908 and the family was still in occupation in 1914, but by 1919 they had moved to Nether Heyford.

In 1920 The Rookery was advertised for sale in the Northampton Mercury. It comprised a 'Lounge Hall with fireplace and lavatory, Dining and Drawing Rooms, full-sized Billiard Room, Ten Bed and Dressing Rooms, Bath Room (h. and c.), three w.c.'s, Tank Room, large Kitchen, Butler's Pantry, Scullery, Larder, Knife Room, and good Cellarage below.' The house was wired for electric light and bells and had excellent drinking water supplied by a windmill pump in the paddock! The grounds 'were tastefully laid out' and included a tennis

court and shrubberies. The property came with stables and the nearby five-roomed detached cottage. It failed to find a buyer and the house was untenanted when it came up for sale again in 1923. It was eventually bought for £3,500 by James Page, a farmer from Nottinghamshire. He also purchased the farm, the original Rookery Farm farmhouse and part of Preston Wood for £2,000. The Pages remained there until James retired in 1947.



Piddington cum Hackleton charts the development of the villages from 1700 to the mid-1950s and includes tales of highway robbery, devastating fires and murder, as well as profiles of Baptist missionary William Carey and Hackleton's very own West End star, Bernard Bedford. It also contains first-hand accounts of everyday life in the villages in the 1930s and '40s.

Today's Preston Deanery Hall was originally the annexe of a much larger country house, parts of which dated back to Tudor times. Preston Deanery Hall tells the story of the house and its various occupants, including a clerk to the Privy Council of James I, and the great grandfather of the founder of the Glyndebourne Opera.


